SECURING HELP FOR FARMERS
 Canadian National Railways co-operating with Provincial Government in Extensive Campaign.

Following a policy inaugurated last year and carried out with much success the Colonization and Development Department of the Canadian National Railways has entered on still more intensive campaign this season to secure help for farmers in all parts of Canada. Station Agents have been supplied with blank application forms which will be furnished to farmers requiring help this spring. On these forms, applicants will set forth the class of help they desire and when wanted, wages, etc., but this does not, in any sense, constitute a contract or involve applicants in any liability. Immigrants from Great Britain and Continental Europe will be coming forward next month in considerable numbers and those who want help should not delay in putting in their applications with the nearest C. N. R. Station Agent. By engaging the new comers farmers can help the cause of land settlement, as many of them will purchase farms of their own as soon as they have gained a knowledge of Canadian methods; and every new settler enhances land values and adds to the general commercial prosperity of the country. Applications may be made for help for any term, but it is desirable that yearly engagements should be made if possible. It is felt that this is best for both employer and employee, as it lessens the possibilities of unemployment during the winter months. It will also tend to make new potential citizens more contented and more inclined to take up permanent residence in the districts where their first locate. As Canadian methods will be strange to most of them it is suggested that employers should show them consideration until they have mastered the details of tasks that may be assigned to them. There have been complaints that some Canadian employers have been unduly harsh with "green" hands and have thus created prejudices against them as a class that are entirely unjustified. In respect to the employment of farm labor the C. N. R. Colonization Department is working closely in co-operation with the Provincial Governments of the Eastern provinces who will attend to the distribution of the help as it becomes available. As already stated farmers who want help this spring should make application at once, as there is going to be a large demand and it will be a case of "first come, first served."

Grain Enquiry Commission Cost Gov't. \$105,586
 (Canadian Press.)

OTTAWA, March 20.—The Royal Grain Enquiry Commission cost the government \$105,586 up to March 1, 1924. The statement laid in the House today, shows that the Chairman, Hon. W. F. A. Turgeon, receives no salary but is allowed living and transportation expenses. The other three commissioners, D. A. McGibbon, W. J. Rutherford, and J. C. Scott receive \$25 per day salary and \$15 a day allowances plus transportation expenses. Darcy Scott, chief counsel received \$100 a day up till Sept. 16th and \$50 a day from then till Oct. 3, plus \$15 per day living allowances.

Unemployment in Britain Shows Good Decrease

 LONDON, Mar. 20.—A large decrease in the number of unemployed announced in official figures this morning demonstrated the improvement in industrial conditions throughout Great Britain during recent weeks. The Labor department states that the total of these out of work today is 1,111,800 which is a decrease of 172,023 since the New Year and it is expected the next return will show just as decided an increase of those at work. Improved conditions are also reflected in the general attitude of employers towards employing both sides seemingly being anxious to do their utmost to prevent such national disasters as a tieup in the shipyards or coal mines regarding both of which there is still some anxiety felt.

World Air Men Head For Canada

 PORTLAND, Ore., March 20.—Three of the army's airplanes making the around-the-world flight rested at Vancouver barracks, Washington, tonight, and the fourth at Eugene, Ore. products the work of under drainage has unfortunately not been encouraged by those who are in need of its benefit. The Provincial Exhibitions have, it is further stated shown a marked improvement over those of previous years. Many of the Judges made special comment on the classes of excellent dairy cows that were exhibited.

Special mention is made by the Commissioner concerning the excellent exhibit of stock that was supplied by the breeders of this Province for the Royal show at Toronto. It included a carload of Guernseys supplied by Roper Bros., a carload of Holsteins supplied for the most part by Alexander Agnew, of Charlottetown, and added to by Gordon Newson of Kingston; also a carload of Yorkshire swine which was supplied by a number of breeders of the province and sent in charge of George Boswell of Frenchton. The result of the exhibit was very encouraging as it was found that many of the animals in this province could compete with distinction in the general classes of what might be considered the best show in the world, and it is expected that in future years a greater number of animals will be exhibited.

It is stated, too, that a number of carloads of cheese were sold through the offices of "The United Dairymen Co-operative," in Montreal, and realized a very substantial price. Moreover, the dairy has shown a reliable increase of production during the full season. The increase is even more evident in the manufacture of butter than cheese.

For the greater part of the forenoon the House was in Committee to further consider the bill to make uniform the laws relating to life insurance. Progress was reported.

On motion of Hon. Dr. McMillan the bill to protect children born out of wedlock was read a second time and committed. Mr. Hunter in the chair. The Leader of the Opposition voiced the importance of "going slow" and being "very careful" in respect to this bill. To make a young man liable for the maintenance of a child born out of wedlock for the long period of sixteen years was a serious matter. No doubt the bill had, in the present law, the parents do not look after their girls, the State should afford them some protection.

Escaped From Camp

 of their departure from Maine, and in that event any information of their return should be sent immediately to the Health Officer. Promptness in complying with this duty might be of great importance in preventing a serious outbreak of the disease on the Island. The men escaped on the 17th inst and information was received yesterday by letter from the Health Officer of the State of Maine and also by wire from the Provincial Health Officer of New Brunswick. Action was immediately taken by telephone and wire in this Province. Instructions were given Capt. Road to prevent the men embarking on the car ferry. The chairman of the Board of Health at Borden was communicated with and they are meeting Dr. Jenkins on the arrival of the Charlottetown train today to discuss with him the situation and the precautions necessary. Additional information may be available when Dr. Jenkins returns tonight from Portland. The type of smallpox epidemic at Windsor, Ontario, is the severest since 1885, the mortality rate being very high. Both the Public Health Act and the School Act of this Province call for the vaccination of children before they are allowed to attend school. The Guardian is informed that these requirements are rigidly carried out in Charlottetown and in the other districts a very small percentage of children at present attending school, or young adults, have been vaccinated. There are two older Island cases from the lumber woods that developed smallpox in Moncton, as referred to recently in the press. It is understood that these men are still in quarantine and will probably remain there for some time. So far there are the only two actual cases of smallpox known to working in the lumber woods. They have been contracted by islanders
