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WINNIPEG, Sept. 14—(CP)—The Manitoba divisional board under the National War Services Act is of the opinion that hockey players subject to call-up for military training are top-notch material for the armed forces and should not play hockey when Canada is at war.

Col. MacPherson said Manitoba hockey players unmarried before July 15, 1940, would not be given approval of the board for military training.

On Friday Mr. Justice J. E. Adanson, Chairman of the Manitoba Divisional Board, refused to authorize applications for passports presented by six hockey players seeking to play with professional teams in the United States.

Mr. Justice Adanson said other applicants would be treated in the same manner and that the ruling "will affect all hockey players of military age in Manitoba who seek to enter the United States."

Mr. Justice Adanson told the six athletes Friday that Canada needs men and that they are the type who would make good soldiers.

The players were Eddie Brunet, 21, and Billy, 23, forwards with Omaha Knights last year in the American Association; Sammy Lavitt, 19, Hugh Miller, 20, and Johnny Aronson, 20, Winnipeg athletes who have been granted tryouts with Detroit Red Wings of the National Hockey League, and Bob Whitelaw, 24, Detroit defenceman, Omaha is a Red Wing farm club.

At Edmonton yesterday Dave MacKay, rookie defenceman with Chicago Black Hawks of the N.H.L., said he will be unable to play with Chicago in the coming season because the Alberta War Services Board had rejected his request for a passport to play in the United States.

Maj.-Gen. L. R. LeFleche, Associated Deputy Minister of National War Services in charge of the call-up of men for compulsory training, said in Ottawa there is no higher court to which the Winnipeg players could apply for permission to leave the country. He said the decision rests entirely with the Manitoba board.

Justice John Doull, Chairman of the Nova Scotia Board, said that the board had not given consideration to the matter as yet.

The New Brunswick board had recently allowed some players to go to the United States for a short time. Chief Justice J. B. M. Baxter said. He added it was "possible" that other applicants might receive similar permission but each case would have to be judged on its individual merits.

Red Ruffing turned in his 15th victory in besting Bobby Feller in the opener, driving across two runs himself with a double in the seventh. Feller was charged with his 12th defeat against 23 victories. Ruffing gave up only three hits, two of them by Jeff Heath.

At Philadelphia, St. Louis Browns showed the Athletics into the league cellar by sweeping a doubleheader as Washington beat Detroit.

The Browns took the opener 7-2 behind good pitching by Bob Muncrief. In the afterpiece Denny Galehouse outpitched Porter Vaughan for a 5-1 victory.

At Washington, a four-hit pitching performance by right-hander Sid Hudson and a lightning-fast triple play by the Senator infield kept the locals a 2-0 shutout over Tigers.

At Boston, the Red Sox swept a doubleheader from the White Sox, 9-2, and 5-2 to increase their second-place lead over Chicago to five full games.

Tigers scored a sensational ninth-inning win over the league leading Yankees Saturday when they tallied four runs after two men had been retired to win 5-3.

Red Sox furthered their lead in second place as they beat out Browns 7-2 while the third place White Sox were giving a trimming from Athletics 3-1.

The cellar dwelling Senators turned the tables on Indians when they scored the extra run in the 11th inning to win 6-5.

Rangers win Sixth straight

LONDON, Sept. 14—(CP Cable). Glasgow Rangers ran their string of victories to six straight today as they defeated Celtic, who were beaten 5-2 by Celtic, had an easy time winning 2-0 from Third Lanark.
