Nazis to control French forces. LONDON, April 19 - (CP)—Reuters heard the Moscow radio broadcast a Tass dispatch from Geneva Saturday night saying a French-German agreement had been reported reacting providing for Nazi control of all French armed forces. The report added: "The agreement also provides for the transfer to the German naval command of three French battleships, six ships of various classes, one aircraft carrier, nine flotilla leaders, 10 destroyers and a certain number of damaged ships which are to be repaired at Toulon and Marseilles on a definite schedule and under supervision of German experts." NAZI STICK-IN-THE-SANDBS. LONDON—(CP)—British trucks are better than German vehicles for desert warfare, said the Nazi Gen. Rommel in Libya. For reconnaissance, only captured English trucks are to be employed, since German trucks, stuck in the sand too often, a captured order said.
