BULLECOURT AND ROEUX NOW HELD BY THE BRITISH

The Germans had Clung Desperately to These Two Important Positions on and Near Hindenburg Line but their Grip has been Loosened. German Counter-Attacks Lack Much of Their Former Fierceness and Show More Reluctance to Face the British Guns.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) BRITISH HEADQUARTERS IN FRANCE VIA LONDON.—From Staff Correspondent of the Associated Press.—British troops have just about completed the absorption of two important villages to which the Germans have clung desperately ever since the battle of Arras began.

THUNDER STORMS COOL THE AIR. The heat wave in the fighting district has been temporarily broken by a series of thunder storms.

FRENCH CAPTURE POSITIONS AND PRISONERS. PARIS.—A French official statement says there was the usual cannonading along the whole front. We repulsed strong German reconnoitering parties which were attempting to approach our lines at various points northeast of Vauxillon, west of Craonne, at Hill 108, near Saignuel and in the Champagne southwest of Nancy.

600,000 GERMAN WITHDRAWN FROM RUSSIAN FRONT TO MEET WESTERN ALLIED ADVANCE. (Canadian Press Despatch.) NEW YORK.—A news agency despatch from Petrograd says: Germany has withdrawn forty divisions, approximately 600,000 men, from the Russian east front and hurried them

to France to oppose the Franco-British offensive.

EARTH SHAKEN 60 MILES AWAY BY BOMBARDMENT. (Canadian Press Despatch.) DOVER, ENGLAND.—The concussion of the bombardment at Zeebrugge, Belgium, was felt here and at the neighboring coast places in quite an unusual manner.

SERBIANS CAPTURE MANY PRISONERS. (Canadian Press Despatch.) SALONKI.—A Serbian statement given out today says our infantry carried more trenches in the region of Dobropoly east of Corina. Bend two violent counter-attacks during the night were repulsed with very great enemy losses.

NUMBER OF GERMAN PRISONERS EXCEPTIONALLY LARGE. The number of prisoners taken during this time has been exceptionally large for the character of the operations and the number of troops involved.

GETTING AFTER THE GERMAN ZEPPELINS

The Fourth Attempt to raid England by Zeppelins Ends in Disaster to the Zeps. (Canadian Press Despatch.) LONDON.—British naval forces destroyed Zeppelin L-22 in the North Sea this morning, according to an official statement issued by the Admiralty.

OTTAWA GIVES A WARM WELCOME TO M. VIVIANI

Former French Premier Was Given a State Reception on Arrival. (Canadian Press Despatch.) OTTAWA.—M. Viviani, ex-Premier of France and at present Minister of Justice in the Government of that country, arrived in Ottawa shortly before noon on Saturday and was off again in the afternoon for Montreal.

THE ALLIES' HARVEST SINCE APRIL 9TH

(Canadian Press Despatch.) WITH THE FRENCH ARMIES IN FRANCE.—According to authoritative figures now available the French, and British armies, between April 9th and May 12th, captured 49,597 Germans, including 976 officers, 444 heavy and field and cannon, 943 machine guns and 386 trench cannons.

U. S. RAISING ARMY TO WAR STRENGTH

One Third of the Additional Number Required Have Already Been Recruited. (Canadian Press Despatch.) WASHINGTON.—Expansion of the regular army to full war strength, contemplated in the administration army bill, has been authorized by President Wilson. Organization of the new recruits will begin tomorrow.

ISLANDERS IN CASUALTY LIST

FOUR PERSONS PERISH IN \$200,000 FIRE. (Canadian Press Despatch.) MANCHESTER, N. H.—Four persons lost their lives and more than a score escaped in their night clothes in a fire which destroyed Weston Hill's mercantile and apartment building on Elm Street early Sunday morning. The loss was estimated at two hundred thousand dollars.

CHIEF GERMAN NAVAL STATION BADLY BURNED

(Canadian Press Despatch.) AMSTERDAM VIA LONDON.—For seven hours on Wednesday a great fire raged on the Imperial wharves at Wilhelmshaven, the Chief German naval station in the North Sea, according to advices received here today. The submarine department building was seriously damaged and the entire district has been closed to the public.

U. S. TAKES OVER THE BELGIAN RELIEF

WASHINGTON.—The United States has arranged to make of \$75,000,000 to Belgium which will be expended by the Belgian Relief Commission. The loan will be advanced at the rate of \$12,500,000 a month of which \$7,000,000 will be available for relief in Belgium and \$5,000,000 for relief in Northern France.

CANADIAN CASUALTIES TOTAL 89,843 OF ALL RANKS SINCE WAR BEGAN.

Since the beginning of the war 89,843 Canadians have been reported in the casualty lists of the Canadian contingent. Last night the following statement was handed out by the Record Office covering the lists up to May 8th:

THE CITY COUNCIL'S MONTHLY MEETING

The City Council met last evening in regular monthly session. His Worship Mayor Brown presided and there were also present, Councillors Wright, Milne, Ratray, Ledwell, Jenkins and McNevin.

A number of communications were read and disposed of. One from Mr. C. R. Smallwood, Secretary of the Charlottetown Exhibition Association, asking for the usual grant towards the next Provincial Exhibition was ordered to lie on the table until the estimates are submitted.

Another was from residents of the Hillsborough Bridge section, asking that the waterworks system be extended to their homes. On motion of Coun. Jenkins, seconded by Coun. McNevin, it was decided that the communication be handed to the Water Commissioners.

A communication from Mrs. David Cavanagh, asking for damages for injury sustained by a fall on an icy sidewalk, during the winter, was referred to the Recorder.

On motion of Coun. Jenkins, seconded by Councillor Ledwell, Hon. S. R. Jenkins was re-appointed a member of the School Board.

A letter from Mr. Benj. Balderston, in regard to school inspection, was to the effect that this is a very important matter and should not be overlooked. He said it should be left till the commencement of the fall term and should be in operation in January, 1918.

Coun. Jenkins said the inspection of schools was a very necessary matter and should be gone into very carefully. Another communication was from Mr. A. B. Fisher, representing the firm of J. W. Windsor, Ltd., who stated that they are operating a similar plant in Charlottetown to those which, according to the press, are applying for exemption from taxation on their can-making plants and material used. Should the Council grant the prayer of these petitioners it was requested that in justice, Mr. Fisher's firm should have its plant included. The communication went on to say: "If you grant the exemption of the present petitioners we most decidedly think our plant should be included, but personally we consider neither the firms now applying nor ourselves have any reasonable claim. We do not think we are in the same position as the Charlottetown Can Company Limited. We are all making an old-style can which has been made here, and also on all parts of the island, for years, and all lobster people, expect a great reduction from now on in the output of this style can."

The Charlottetown Can Co., Ltd., to our mind is in an entirely different position and entitled to exemption."
