IN MEMORIAM
JOSEPH HARRINGTON

Pneumonia is still claiming its victims in this city and the Postal Service has lost another of its members, Mr. Joseph Harrington having passed away on Saturday evening in the City Hospital. His funeral took place Sunday afternoon from Mr. Hennessy's Undertaking rooms to St. Dunstan's Cathedral and thence to the Catholic Cemetery, attended by representatives of the Postal Department and the Great War Veterans Association.

The late Mr. Harrington belonged to Coleman and enlisted for overseas service early in the war. He went through several engagements, was wounded and subsequently received his discharge. He was appointed as a Railway Mail Clerk in May last and proved to be a very efficient official and was highly esteemed by his fellow employees. After completing his regular trip from Tignish on the 31st January he complained of having a cold which gradually developed into pleuro-pneumonia terminating fatally on the 8th instant. He was in his 35th year. The Jags on the Post Office and over the Great War Veterans Rooms were at half mast yesterday.


