

Weekly Livestock Market Report

SUMMARY

OTTAWA, Dec. 15 — Hogs and lambs were the feature of the live stock market situation this week, both classes selling definitely stronger and mostly at higher prices. The trend of the market, however, was easier under dull trading and prices at most markets were barely steady to 15c or 25c lower. With the holiday season approaching and poultry occupying the spotlight, cattle buyers were operating indifferently and were in need of only moderate supplies. With this fact in mind, shippers would do well to heed recent warnings regarding the probable condition of the trade for the immediate future and adjust country loadings accordingly. Calf prices were mostly firm, except at Toronto where veals lost 50c to \$1. As mentioned before, hogs sold higher, the advance amounting mostly to about 25c, while lambs, as a rule, strengthened about 25c also.

Cattle Trade Easier

Only a few top quality weighty steers and butchers maintained steady levels at Toronto, while other classes of killing cattle were losing 15c to 25c on a dull market, and this despite a moderate supply. Some small lots of choice weighty steers made \$6.65 to \$7, the latter price representing the top of the market for the week and good butchers brought \$5.75 to \$6. A small supply of stockers was cleared at steady rates from \$4.25 to \$5.50. With a lighter offering on hand, cattle were slow and lower at Montreal with good steers making \$6 to \$6.50. The restricted pre-holiday demand was in evidence as country loadings were fairly moderate and this served to check any appreciable declines in prices. A few outstanding finished heavy steers stopped at \$7 but comparatively few heavyweight killers made up to \$6, while the bulk went between \$4.50 and \$5.50. Demand for stockers and feeders showed signs of tapering off, although outside orders were taken care of the moderate deliveries on hand. Yard take on many shipping cattle at this season. The better grades of stockers sold at \$4.25 to \$4.75. Calgary was somewhat slow and good to choice butcher steers cashed at \$4.75 to \$5.50. Edmonton was fairly active on light butchers but draggy on heavy kinds with prices being lower. The top of the steer division was \$6. Moose Jaw was generally easier to 25c down to \$5.15, the top price on steers at \$5.25. The market was fairly steady up to a top of \$5.25, while Saskatoon had a few better quality grain-fed steers and heifers at \$5.25. The market was fairly active at Vancouver with good to choice steers at \$5 to \$6.

United States Market Slow and Easier

American markets were generally slow and tending toward lower prices. Only a couple of loads of Canadian steers were sold at Buffalo, one at \$8.75 and the other at \$3.25. Quotations from St. Paul on Canadian feeder steers were \$7 to \$7.50 and on beef steers up to \$8. Exports for the week accounted for 2,908 best cattle, 294 dairy, and 191 calves, making the totals to date this year 79,185 beef, 11,678 dairy, 46,147 calves, and 95 hogs. During the corresponding heavy 1932 shipments amounted to 178,711 beef, 13,157 dairy, 103,882 calves, and 64,242 hogs.

The British Market

Very mild unseasonable weather has been influencing the meat trade adversely in the United Kingdom. Fat cattle have been variable, both in quality and price, and the market for stores is quiet. There is still a keen demand, however, for good dairy cows. Best light cattle were selling from 13 1/2 to 14c per lb., dressed weight including offal at Birkenhead and Glasgow estimated good Canadian feeders would bring around 7 3/4c alive. There were no exports to the United Kingdom during the month of December to date this year amount to 27,068, as compared with 9,762 last year.

Calves Easier in East, Firmer in West

Calves dropped 50c to \$1 at Toronto, closing a general top of \$9 for choice veals, while at the same time Montreal was unchanged on 25c to 50c on grasser veals at \$2.50 to \$4. Winnipeg maintaining a firm position and had good to choice veals at \$8 to \$9. Calves marketed at higher up and Ed-Ed-Ed topped at \$6.50 at Montreal and \$7. Moose Jaw was \$6 and at Saskatoon and Regina \$7.50. Good light veals made \$8.00 to \$8.50 at Vancouver.

Hog Prices Again Move Up

The British bacon market was unchanged with Canadian hams selling from 85c to 88c, Canadian hams sold from 96c to 98c. Demand for hogs was good at Toronto and closed with bacon at \$9 off trucks. Several cars were shipped to out for hogs was good at Montreal at \$9 for bacon f. & w. Western markets were inelastic but closed definitely higher. The close at Winnipeg was \$8.75 for bacon f. & w. Calgary bacon closed at \$8.10.

Lamb Prices Make Further Gains

Lamb prices moved up 25c at Toronto at the opening and held the advance throughout, good ewes and wethers delivered by rail selling at \$9.50. Small lots of fancy Southdowns sold for the holiday trade at \$10 to \$10.75. Montreal was unchanged at \$9 for good lambs, while Winnipeg took on added strength and best offerings went at \$9 to \$9.25. Calgary was higher also, at \$7 to \$7.25 for top and Edmonton firmed up to a top of \$7.25. The top at Prince Albert was \$6.75, Moose Jaw \$7, Saskatoon \$7.35, and Regina \$7.50.

CATTLE MARKETS

TORONTO disposed of 4,910 cattle under a very dull trade and about 200 of the plainer sorts were unsold. A few top weighty steers and butchers held steady but other killing classes were down 15c to 25c. Choice weighty steers sold in small lots at \$6.50 to \$7. Good plainer steers were at \$5.75 to \$6, common down to \$4. Butcher cows dropped 25c selling at \$2.75 to \$3.75 and canners at \$2 to \$2.50. Choice fed calves were steady at \$8.50 to \$9.25 but inferior kinds were lower and mostly \$7 to \$7.50. Small stocker supply cleared steady at \$4.25 to \$5.50, and a few stock calves reached \$6.25. Milkers and springers slumped \$5 to \$10 per head, top springers selling around \$70 to \$75 each.

MONTREAL sold 1,251 cattle and was generally slow and lower. Good steers were at \$6 to \$6.50, mediums \$5.25 to \$5.75, and common \$4 to \$5. Heifers ranged from \$3 to \$5.25. Cows were slow with good at \$3.75 to \$4.25, mediums \$2.75, and canners and cutters \$2 to \$2.50.

CALF MARKETS

TORONTO calves dropped 50c to \$1 closing at \$9 for choice veal and \$5 to \$7.50 for common to medium. Grassers \$4.50.

MONTREAL veals were unchanged at \$8 to \$10.50 and drinker made \$4.50 to \$5. Grassers were 25c to 50c lower at \$3.50 to \$4.

HOG MARKETS

The hog run for the Dominion was 79,241, compared with 101,862 in the same week a year ago. Totals to date this year 3,110,997, last year 3,794,323.

TORONTO gained 25c, closing at \$9 for bacon f. & w. Sows were \$6.50 to \$6.75.

HAMILTON packers' prices closed at \$8.50 to \$8.90 for bacon f. & w. trucks alive and \$11.65 to \$12.05 dressed.

Curb Licenses To Oriental Fishermen

OTTAWA, Dec. 20 - (GP) - Sharp reduction in the number of licenses issued to fishermen of oriental origin in British Columbia in recent years was reported today in the annual report of the Dominion Department of Fisheries. "A noteworthy development in British Columbia's fishing industry in the last 15 years or so," said the Government report, "has been the increasing measure in which fishing operations have come to be centered in the hands of white fishermen." "None but British subjects may obtain commercial fishing licenses from the Department, but in recent years, contrary perhaps to some popular impressions, there has been substantial reduction in the percentage of Pacific Coast licensees who are British subjects or oriental origin and a corresponding rise in the percentage of white licensees."
