Nickel Leads Uptrend On Montreal Mart

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Sept. 11—Interest centred around International Nickel and several selected issues on the Montreal Stock Exchange today as the market rallied in the face of continued encouraging reports from trade and industry.

Trading was only average and volume failed to touch the 8,000 mark. The market again took a large volume of profit-taking in its stride to move into higher ground.

Newspaper and textile issues were also in fairly heavy demand. Bruck Silk jumped 7-8 at 17 1-8 and Canadian Celanese was up 1-2 at 21 1-2.

STOCKS REACH NEW HIGH ON N. Y. MARKET

(By Frank MacMillan, Associated Press Financial Writer) (A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Sept. 11—Rising stock tickers rattled out a story of the share market today which recalled some of the rousing sessions of the late lamented bull market of 1929.

The stock list pushed ahead again into new high territory for the year at a trading pace which was last surpassed at the climax of the market break in the mid-summer of last year.

A number of active issues rose from 1 to 3 points to new peaks for a year or longer, but it was notable that a good many of the shares ordinarily looked to in Wall Street for leadership churned about rapidly with little to show for their volatility.

The flame of buying enthusiasm which rushed through the stock list, however, failed to spread to any degree to other markets. With the exception of rails, most corporate issues in the bond market were hesitant.

U. S. government obligations mostly shaded low. Stocks ahead about 2 to 3 points included Westinghouse at 79 1-8, U. S. Smelting at 95, C-llins & Aikman at 32 1-8, Howe Sound at 51 1-4 and Electric Auto-Lite at 31 1-4.

Some of the issues up only slightly at the close or showing small declines were U. S. Steel, Standard Oil of N. J., Sears, Santa Fe, General Motors and International Harvester.

Principal gainers in the Canadian list were Hiram Walker and Noranda, both up more than a point. Fractional improvement was recorded by such issues as Dome Mines, McIntyre-Porepine, International Nickel, Distillers-Seagrams and Bell Telephone of Canada.

Canadian Pacific, Dominion Stores, Brazilian and Ford of Canada were slightly lower.

FRUIT INDUSTRY OF SOUTH AFRICA IS IN FLOURISHING STATE

Fruit is one of South Africa's up and coming industries, and much such headway that it will soon be in the position of the Union's second industry, ranking next to wool.

Gold is the chief export, entirely market for fruit, particularly citrus. Sugar and maize, however, are the two main commodities which Canada takes from South Africa.

Other products are wool, perfumes, sheep skins, manganese, according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. Canada took 36 per cent of South Africa's exports in 1934 and moved from sixth to fourth place as regards imports, an increase of over 100 per cent as compared with the previous year.

As regards total exports from South Africa, Britain is in first place followed by France, Belgium, Germany, Italy, Holland, Canada, the United States, the latter taking goat skins, sheep skins, diamonds and chrome ore.

PRODUCE

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Sept. 11—Demand was curtailed on the Montreal dairy and produce market today and egg prices eased slightly while other lines were about the same as previous quotations. On the egg market graded shipments in cartons or less were quoted at 34 cents a dozen for large, 31 1/2 to 32 cents for A-medium, 22 1/2 to 23 cents for B and 20 cents for C. Receipts were 850 cases.

At the weekly auction held today, no 1 Quebec butter sold at 22 1/2 cents and no 1 Quebec cheese at 10 11-16 cents a pound. No 1 colored Quebec cheese brought 11 1/4 cents. Butter prices were quoted on the market at 23 cents a pound for cartons or less of no 1 with small lots to retailers at 23 1/2 to 23 cents a pound for solids and a cent more for prints. Receipts were 910 boxes.

The cheese market was 11 1/4 to 11 1/2 cents a pound for no 1 Ontario with no 1 Quebec at 10 1/2 to 11 cents. Arrivals totaled 2,770 boxes. Quebec potatoes in 80-pound bags continued at 35 to 40 cents.
