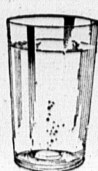

"Have you seen Mr. Anthony?" Alma asked breathlessly. "Has he been here this morning?"

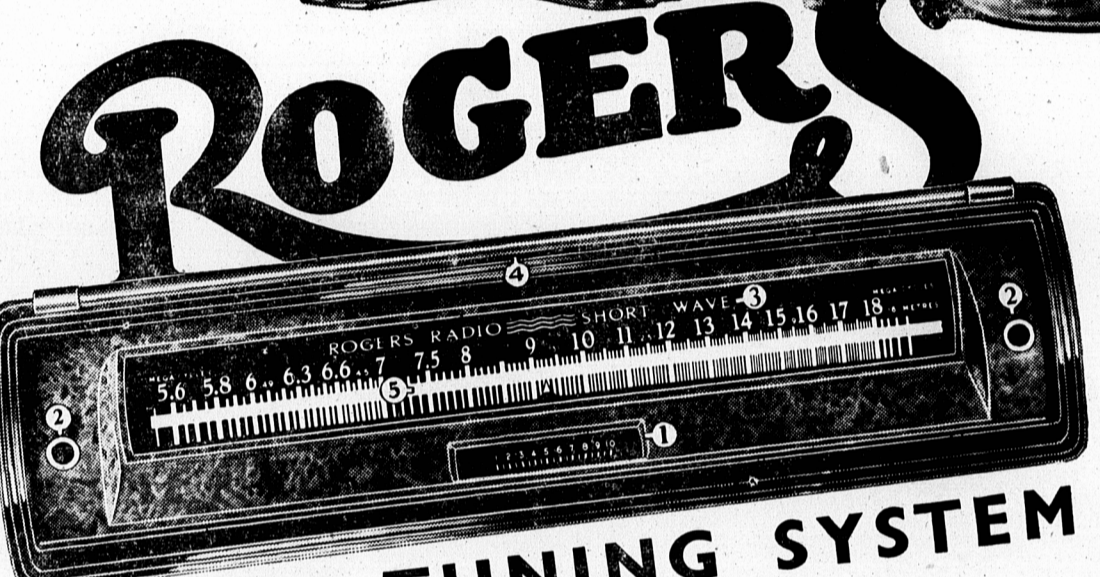

Melted 1-4 cup shortening in 1-4 cup scalded milk add 1 tablespoon sugar, a cant 1-2 teaspoon salt, and when lukewarm crumble into it 1-8 or 1 whole yeast cake; add 2 eggs, unbeaten, and 2 cups sifted bread

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
