ISLAND JERSEY WINS SILVER MEDAL-Prince Edward Island has laid claim to one of the silver medals of the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club. Daisy M. G. is her name and she is owned by Wm. Clark, New Wiltshire, who is building up one of the best herds in the Maritimes. Daisy freshened at the age of 1 year, 362 days and produced in 305 days, 7,603 pounds of milk and 480 pounds of fat, thus qualifying by a wide margin for a silver medal. Incidentally she is one of the youngest Jerseys in Canada to win a medal of any kind in the 305 day division.

A GREAT WORK-A check for \$52.00 was received on January 12, by Mrs. W. J. MacIntyre, National President of the C. W. L. from Rev. A. P. MacLellan. Fishing Trawler Crew Rescued

(Canadian Press) NORFOLK, Va., Jan. 14-Seven men composing the crew of the fishing trawler, Saint Rta., of Gloucester, Mass., were rescued in surfboats, by the crew of the Paul Gamble coast guard station yesterday morning, after their craft had stranded on the coast about a mile south of the station.

The vessel, bound to Hampton, Va., with a load of fish, was driven ashore during a strong southeast gale at three o'clock in the morning. The craft was seen soon after she struck, her signals of distress in the shape of rockets observed by coast guardsmen patrolling the coast.

Two surfboats, put out from the Paul Gamble Station and reached the stranded craft and despite heavy seas, the rescue was one of the quickest made on the coast in some time. Soon after the men had been taken from the trawler she began to fill with water and tonight the vessel and her one hundred and seventy five barrels of fish were reported a total loss.

DEATH OF CAPE BAULD MAN RECALLS SOME SHEDIAC TRAGEDIES

SHEDIAC, Jan. 13.-Sylvain A. Bourque, of Cape Bauld, parish of Botsford, died yesterday in Hotel Dieu, Moncton, after being in failing health for several months. The cause of death was gangrene, resulting from cutting a corn. Mr. Bourque was for many years a hotel man in Shediac and Lynn, Mass. an since his retirement from the hotel business had conducted a store in Cape Bauld, where he was born 79 years ago. Nearly 60 years ago he conducted the Union Hotel formerly The Waverley House, Shediac, which was later burned and replaced by the Terrace Hotel, converted a few years ago into the present Dominion government building. The Waverley House was

"Lawyer's Secret" Tense Romantic Drama

Drama, neither stark nor terrifying, but intensely real, human and emotionally exciting, came to the Prince Edward Theatre screen yesterday. It is contained in "The Lawyer's Secret," in which an excellent and all-star cast, headed by Olive Brook, Charles Rogers and Richard Arlen, brings to life a tense complication of modern-day living.

The vividness of "The Lawyer's Secret" is intensified by the intelligent presentation of its drama. Its audiences are made to feel its vital significance for each one of them. Its web of circumstances might wind itself around any unthinkable individual, just as it winds, in the picture, around Brook, the suave lawyer; Rogers, the weakling playboy; Arlen, the reckless young sailor.

"The Lawyer's Secret" is the story of a professional man's fight to preserve the ethics of his profession and his love for a girl, Fay Wray, by stilling his natural human duty to prevent injustice to an innocent man, Arlen, on trial for his life, for a crime of which he is innocent, nearly pays the supreme penalty because Brook cannot reveal a secret confided to him by Rogers, his client and Fay's brother.

This picture is also significant as an introduction to serious drama of the popular juvenile, Charles Rogers. It marks the first time Rogers has had an opportunity to display his real dramatic ability on the talking screen. For those who remember his appealing portrayal in "Wings," his ability as shown in this deeply emotional role will come as no surprise.

The scene of the alleged murder of Timothy McCarthy of Moncton, a celebrated mystery case, on the night of Oct. 12, 1877. McCarthy was on his way to Prince Edward Island to purchase horses at the time. He disappeared and his body was found in the Scoudouc river, when the ice broke up in the following spring. Although Harry Osborne, hotel clerk and members of his father's family who conducted the hotel were tried for the crime, they were never convicted.

The case attracted general attention all over Eastern Canada and the United States.

James Farrell, who succeeded the Osbornes at the Waverley House was fatally shot 10 years later at Painssee by William Bastien an innkeeper, on whom Farrell, a constable attempted to serve papers in a liquor case. Bastien shot and killed himself.

Mr. Bourque, after leaving Shediac, went to Lynn, Mass., where for 30 years he was clerk at the Seymour Hotel. He returned to Cape Bauld five years ago, opening a store. He is survived by three brothers, Frank A., of Shediac, Philias of Sackville, and Andre Bourque, of Cape Bauld, and a sister, Mrs. Malefant, wife of Capt John Malefant, of Moncton and formerly of Shediac, well known printer and publisher and formerly quartermaster of the 165th Battalion. He was unmarried.
