Demolition of Canada millions of dollars, despite a depleted treasury, were cheerfully furnished to the end that none could suffer from want of bread and public works were instituted to give labor to those in need. Corrective measures of legislation enacted and advance measures of fiscal reforms so that the influence of the depression might be combated to bring relief to the people.

AND WHEREAS due to the re-implementation of the recommendation of the Duncan Commission large increased grants were given to the provinces, thus adding substantial added revenues, AND WHEREAS by revision of the tariffs, especially in regard to the restricting of butter imports and other farm products, a substantial stimulus was given to agriculture, the benefits of which are being received up to the present day.

AND WHEREAS the Honourable R. B. Bennett succeeded in leading the Imperial Conference regarding the whole Empire into a system of trade and commerce the advantages of which have been fully approved by statesmen on every part of the British Commonwealth of Nations.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that this meeting of the Liberal-Conservative Association of Prince County in annual session assembled take pleasure in expressing their high appreciation of the invaluable service rendered to Canada and the Empire by the Government so ably led by the Honourable R. B. Bennett whose talent and economic foresight have earned the admiration of the best statesmen at home and abroad.

tribute to MacMillan Government

Mr. C. E. MacKenzie, seconded by City Councillor A. A. Hennessey, then moved the following resolution, which was also adopted unanimously:

WHEREAS in line with practically every governing party on the continent our party suffered defeat in the last Provincial Election, a defeat of one of the most careful and progressive governments ever to hold office in this Province, brought on due to the great forces of the world's depression, shamelessly exploited by our opponents and accompanied by scores of election promises never intended to be fulfilled.

AND WHEREAS we view with regret the failure of the present Government to fulfill their election promises to lighten expenses of administration, to reduce taxation, to maintain and continue the program of permanent highways, to inaugurate a scheme for giving work to the unemployed, to balance the budget, to give one hundred per cent. of law enforcement, to the establishing of cold storage facilities throughout the Province.

AND WHEREAS during the course of power of the past Conservative Government many public works of great public benefit such as the MacMillan-Bennett Highway, the Prince of Wales College, the Fairview Hospital, the Fairview and other undertakings, were completed at a minimum of cost and expense which has challenged the criticism of the present Government in office or its elastic press.

AND WHEREAS during the course of the past Conservative Government under the leadership of Mr. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan with the assistance of our Federal Conservative members, this Province received very large subsidies and other grants from Ottawa whereas the present Government has made no effort or has succeeded in getting an increase of revenue from this source whatsoever.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED

ED that this meeting of the Liberal-Conservative Association of Queen's County in annual session assembled do go on record in expressing our appreciation of the record of the late Conservative administration led by the Hon. W. J. P. MacMillan, and take this our first opportunity to tender our confidence in the late Government feeling that the electors of this Province are awaiting the first occasion of replacing a Conservative Government in power.

President Kennedy

"On this, the occasion of our annual gathering," said President Kennedy in his opening remark, "permit me first of all to cordially thank you for the high honor you conferred when you elected me President of this Association. May I here express my warm appreciation of that splendid co-operation on the part of the Officials, Candidates and Field Workers, so united and helpful to myself and associate; in the performance of our arduous duties.

"We are, we believe, happily approaching the end of one of the worst periods of business depression known in the world's history. Fortunately for the greater part of this period the Government of Canada was led by that able Statesman, the Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett a sociated with whom was an Executive of outstanding ability and this Province was under the discreet administration of the Stewart-MacMillan Government whose wisdom and great grasp of National and Provincial economic needs combined to save Canada and our Province from much of the hardship which other countries were compelled to suffer.

"The Imperial Conference brought about by Premier Bennett in the early years of his ministry, welding the British Empire and its Dominions into one great economic Commonwealth has been credited by the great statesmen of the world, including the best type of discerning Liberals with being the most effective accomplishment of master statesmanship in relieving us from much of the world wide stagnation in trade and keeping Canada in the forefront as an example to the nations.

"The Conservative Reform Legislation, providing for loans and help to farmers, fishermen, miners and artisans—pensions for those of advanced age, momentous programs of public undertakings to provide work for the unemployed and Premier Bennett's immortal declaration that 'No person in Canada would suffer 'subject want', accompanied by Acts of Parliament and orders of Government to give them effect, sheds lustre upon a record which history may never duplicate.

A Record of Achievement

"In our own Province we boast of that magnificent undertaking, the Borden Highway, commenced and completed under the able and friendly co-operation of the Bennett - MacMillan Governments, against which none dare make protest either concerning the great value of that work to our people or the low cost of construction.

"That hand-ome and commodious Prince of Wales College, equipped with its semi-university accommodations, bringing it into the class of the higher educational systems of Canada, will continue as a lasting memorial to the foresight and sound judgment of Premier MacMillan, to whom, as Minister of Education is due the chief merit for its creation. Then to this we add the new Falconwood Hospital, an admitted credit to its designers and builders; the new Rocky Point ferry boat, the 'Fairview'; improved roads, permanent steel bridges and a host of substantial undertakings too numerous to mention within the limits of this address. Also to these the large grants received from Ottawa, our largely increased subsidy, hundreds of thousands of dollars from the

Federal Treasury for relief and other helpful projects, thus relieving our taxpayers of the heavy burden which they would have been compelled to carry but for those munificent contributions.

"Yet with all the records of achievement and public benefits, our party went down to defeat in the General and Provincial Elections. Such was the fate of every other Government appealing to the people while their country was in the throes of the great depression. "The most brilliant statesmen in the world and the grandest of public benefactors fell by the wayside, victims of the unrest and discontent of a people suffering severely the pangs of economic distress.

"The fact that our Conservative Leaders in all Departments of Government unselfishly devoted their whole time and talents to the problems of recovery which they were grappling with, neglecting to play the game of politics in their efforts to reduce the distress of the people, giving no attention to party organization or election propaganda, contributed very materially to the extent of the defeat. Had the Bennett and MacMillan Governments devoted as much time to electioneering as they did patriotically to their country's interests, while they might not have averted defeat it is certain that they would have received a vastly greater measure of support than was given them.

"We can now see the edge of the silver lining of the dark cloud of depression. We rejoice that the foundation laid by our Conservative Governments has been accepted as the best by the incoming Governments, and they make good only to the extent that they build upon those laid foundations. Our policies are being used and Canada benefits by their use. While trifling variations have been made in details, the boundaries of our recovery from the depression are only as encompassed within the four corners of the economic program formulated by the Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett and the talented Conservative Premiers of Canada whose counsels and accomplishments are now producing their results.

"Liberal-Conservatives to you I have only the message of optimism. Comparing these bright records of the past with the inaction of the present, the wisdom of the people is already in the moods of dissatisfaction. They fail to see traces of those alluring promises of our opponents being fulfilled. They are now aware that it was a change from substance to shadow, and when the opportunity is again given and they are asked to speak with their ballots there is little room to doubt that it will be in that certain voice of denunciation as they again restore to power the grand old Conservative Party, that has so long stood for the upbuilding of our country and the prosperity of all her enterprises and
