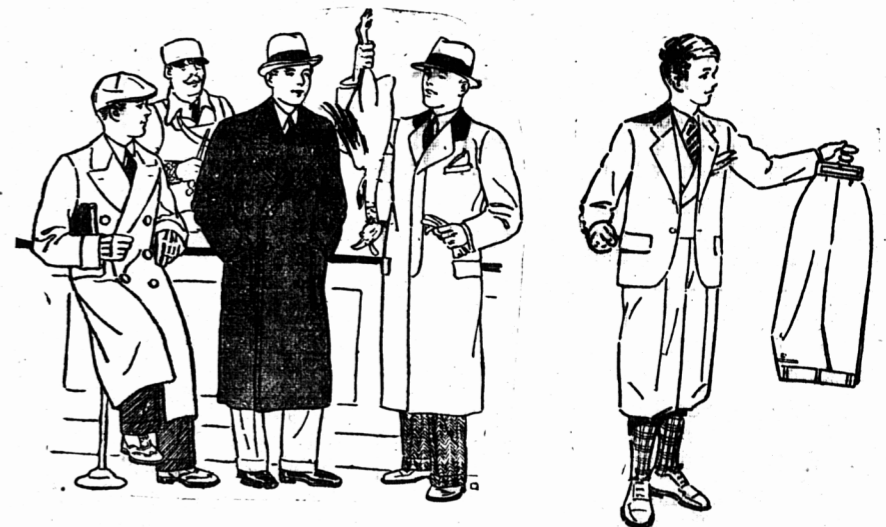

—CHICKEN SUPPER—A largely attended chicken supper was held in the hall at Travellers' Rest last Thursday evening, under the auspices of the Women's Institute. The sum of about sixty five dollars was realized, which will be used toward the equipment of their splendid hall.

—LAST TRIP OF THE SEASON—The schooner Maud Weston, Captain Weston, which has been carrying lumber all summer for Messrs. M. T. Schurman and Co., Summerside, has made her last trip for this season and left at the week end for her home port, Richibucto, N. B., where Captain Weston will lay her up for the winter.

—WHIST PARTY IN ST. PAUL'S HALL—A very successful whist party was held in St. Paul's Hall, Summerside, under the auspices of the Society of the Children of Mary. The ladies' prize was won by Miss Dora Wedge; consolation, Mrs. J. M. Peters; gentlemen's prize, Hon. A. F. Arsenault; consolation, Mr. George Gallant. The card party was followed by an auction sale of fancy articles donated by the Children of Mary. The proceeds, which amounted to the handsome sum of eighty eight dollars, were in aid of St. Mary's Academy, Summerside.

—DISMISSED BY STIPENDIARY—In the police court at Summerside on Friday last an adjourned Prohibition case came up before Stipendiary Wyatt for judgment. In this case the defendant had been charged by a Prohibition Officer

without a warrant and liquor found upon his person. His Honor quoted a similar case (Trednick versus Graham) which had been tried in the County Court and dismissed. Stipendiary Wyatt, following this precedent, dismissed the case before him.

—THIRD TRAGIC DEATH IN FEW MONTHS—On Friday last the remains of Mr. Joseph O'Connor, who was killed in a gasoline explosion last week at Chelsea, Mass., were laid to rest in St. Mark's Cemetery, Lot 7. He was only nineteen years of age and leaves his father, Mr. Joseph O'Connor, and eight brothers and sisters to mourn. It is only a little over a year ago that two other young men who had gone to the United States from the same island parish, Messrs. McCarthy and O'Halloran, met their deaths in a street car tragedy in an Ohio city and their remains were brought home and also repose in the same cemetery.

—DIED SUDDENLY—Mrs. William MacDonald, late of DeSable and formerly of Cape Traverse died suddenly on Saturday morning at the home of Mrs. T. C. Muncey, of Carleton where she was visiting. The deceased was eighty four years of age and was housekeeper for many years to the late Rev. James MacDougall and was a member of the Church of Scotland at Cape Traverse. Mrs. MacDonald was apparently quite in her usual health when she took a weak spell, lay down on the couch and immediately passed away. Two step daughters were left to mourn. The funeral will take place this afternoon at one o'clock from the Kirk to the Cemetery at Cape Traverse, Rev. Ewen MacDougall officiating.

—A PRETTY WEDDING—The marriage was solemnized in the Mont Carmel Church on Wednesday last of Miss Demerise Arsenault, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Arsenault, of Fifteen Point, to Mr. Aubin Gallant, of Mont Carmel.

Rev. Theodore Gallant performed the ceremony, in the presence of the immediate friends and relatives. The bride looked charming in a rosewood dress of silk flat crepe with hat to match and was attended by the sister of the groom, Miss Sybil Gallant. The groom was supported by Mr. Aubin Arsenault. After the ceremony the bridal party repaired to a sumptuous wedding feast. In the evening a reception was held at the home of the groom's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jerome Gallant, attended by about one hundred and fifty invited guests, who were bountifully entertained, and dancing was indulged in until the small hours of the morning, when all departed to their homes, wishing the happy young couple all prosperity and happiness. —SCHOLARS ADDRESSED—The Summerside High School closed on Friday morning for the Thanksgiving holidays, when an interesting programme was carried out in the Assembly Hall in the school. Dr. E. T. Tanton, chairman of the Summer-side school board of trustees, presided. Opening chorus, "O Canada" by the pupils; Scripture reading, a few remarks by Dr. Tanton. Mayor Arnett then gave a short address on the opportunities the pupils were afforded by being present at the school to commemorate Armistice Day. A very splendid and inspiring address was then given by Rev. J. P. C. France, of the Trinity United Church, explaining to the children what this great day means to the Empire. The children then rendered very beautifully that wonderful hymn "O God Our Help in Ages Past," followed by the Flag Salute and "God Save the King." —BUSY SHIPPING WEEK-END—The S. S. Boniface, an English vessel, of 7,800 tons gross and manned by an all-English crew of fifty felly tars, the trimmest and largest vessel to ever tie up to a Summerside wharf, arrived here on Friday evening from Georgetown, where she was part loaded with Island certified seed potatoes. The Boniface's home port is Liverpool, England, and this is her maiden voyage; as she was only built this year and was recently put in commission for the Boat Line. She is a right up to date freighter and has a speed of 15 knots. After taking on 40,000 bags of seed potatoes at Summerside she left for Charlottetown on Sunday to finish loading here. The Danish steamer Gronland, which arrived at Summerside last Wednesday afternoon, has finished loading 20,000 bags of table stock for the Harris Abbotson Company of Charlottetown, and will sail for Havana, Cuba, today. The tern schooner James William, owned by Mr. John E. Campbell of Summerside, is now finishing loading a full cargo of table stock at the Railway Wharf and expects to
