## EXPERIMENTING WITH APPLIES.

ST JOHN, Feb. 26.—W. W. Moore, Chief of the market branch of the Canadian storage department, Ottawa, arrived in the city yesterday and is here to look after a shipment of apples which the agricultural department at Ottawa are sending to the mother country. This shipment is one of a carload of seven which they purchased last autumn in Ontario for experimental purposes. For the last two years there have been numerous complaints coming from England regarding the poor condition of the apples which they receive there from Canada. It seems that through some defect in the packing, or else from not being properly cared for while in cold storage, the apples in the course of time, become putrid here and in the English markets.

The result of this is obvious, and the Canadian shippers have had to stand for a great reduction in their prices. The agricultural department, however, have taken up the question and are now endeavoring to better conditions. Last autumn they purchased seven carloads of apples from Ontario and used them all strictly for experimental purposes. Among other things they have tried different methods of packing and have also placed apples in cold storage at different degrees of temperature. Which ever proves to be the better means of preserving the fruit will be resorted to in future. This will not be known, however, until all the shipments have been received in England and word sent out from there.

The shipment, in which Mr. Moore is at present interested in, will be made on the steamer Cassandra, sail-

ing from here next week. Speaking of the butter and cheese exports from this country to England during the last year, Mr. Moore said that there was a marked increase in the shipment of cheese, but a great falling off in butter. He attributes the decrease in the export of butter to the fact that the home consumption of this is now greater than that of late a large amount of the Quebec and Ontario cream is being sent to the United States.

## NOVA SCOTIA HOUSE OPENED YESTERDAY.

HALIFAX, Feb. 26.—The Provincial Legislature opened this afternoon with the usual military display. The Government caucus met in the forenoon and elected George E. Fowler as Speaker of the House. In the Speech from the Throne, Governor Fraser referred to the adjustment of the difficulties between the coal and steel industries of the eastern section of the Province as a matter of satisfaction.

He expressed his pleasure that in all branches of agriculture there is abundant evidence of progress, and referred to the usefulness of the agricultural college. Other topics touched upon were the betterment of the highway through the expenditure of the Provincial road grant methods for better utilization and conservation of the natural resources of Canada; the proposed legislation to enable the minister of railways to lease branch lines connected with the I.C.R.; the work of the commission on the limitation of hours of labor; the presentation during the session, for the first time in many years, of a report of the vital statistics of the province; compensation to workmen for injuries received from engaging in their calling; the proposed plan for the creation of a Canadian naval service to act in co-operation with and close relation to the imperial navy.

The address in reply was moved by R. M. McGregor, of Pictou, and was seconded by J. H. Livingstone, of Cumberland.

## STRIKE LIKELY OF AMERICAN TRAINMEN.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Feb. 26.—The replies of the southern railroads to the ultimatum of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen and the Order of Railway Conductors were opened here today. The refusal of the roads to meet the men's terms was unanimous.

This places the southern railroad situation in practically the same state as that in the territory north of the Chesapeake and Ohio and east of the Mississippi. It is now certain that any action taken by the men to press their demands will be simultaneous in the east and south.

The result of the strike vote of the Baltimore and Ohio men will be submitted to President W. G. Lee, of the trainmen, and Grand Master Garretson, of the conductors, early this week. If the decision is to call a strike as it is expected to be, the executive council of the two orders, which will meet here later, are expected to submit to the men on all the railroad lines, the question whether a general strike shall be called.

The strike votes on the Baltimore and Ohio and at large will not be immediately effective. It is understood at the brotherhood headquarters here that the votes in the territory north of the Chesapeake and Ohio men will be used only in the event of a final refusal by the roads to concede the wage adjustment asked.
