FAMOUS MARCH

Sergt. McDonald Writes of a Great Tramp IN THE PHILLIPINES

Pasig River Crossed 45 Times by a P. E. Islander.

(From the Minneapolis Tribune.)

The famous Sherman march from Atlanta to the Atlantic coast in 1865 has now a rival in one of the most arduous, difficult and under the conditions most successful marches ever recorded in ancient or modern history of warfare.

The march in question has recently been accomplished by a number of the United States troops in Philippine Islands the first news of the enterprising undertaking being received in letters by Oscar Wirtensohn, well known in bicycle circles in the city, and formerly a member of the 13th Minn. volunteers, from Sergt. A. H. McDonald, Co. E. 37th regiment, United States volunteers.

Sergt. McDonald writes: "Oct. 3 d the transport Granney and the cruiser Yorktown left for Bannagon, having on board two companies of the Fourth Infantry and six companies of the 13th, which were to make the distance by water.

"Gen. Hall and two companies, 37th volunteers, two companies of the 13th infantry, two companies of the 12th infantry, and one troop of the Fourth cavalry, started simultaneously to march the distance of 45 miles by foot over the overland route.

"The roads were in such bad condition that we had to take 200 Chinamen to carry the baggage and ammunition, mule teams being out of the question. In the course of our route we crossed the Pasig river and its tributaries 45 times. By constant wetting we lost most of our commissary provisions, and much was entirely lost tract of an account of the Chinamen continually dropping out.

SAVED CHINAMEN FROM DROWNING.

"Three privates were mentioned in Gen. Hall's report of courage displayed in rescuing several Chinamen in crossing rivers. For four days we had only a slice of bacon per man a day, and each man had to take an additional 100 rounds of ammunition to lighten the weight of the loads carried by the Chinamen.

"On the third day of the march 30 insurgents were captured, and Gen. Hall's horse killed under him. On the sixth day we came to the beach, about two miles above the transport. Gen. Hall and the sick and wounded were taken aboard. As far as we know there had died on the road from exhaustion five Americans and 45 Chinamen. The disabled sick consisted of 165 privates and 45 Chinamen.

"We then boarded small boats and were sent up the Agos river, where we fought for one and one half hours in four feet of

water. The loss was 15 killed and three wounded. Seven of the killed were members of the 37th volunteers, and the other eight from the 15th infantry. The insurgents found killed and wounded were between 50 and 75.

"After we had driven them out of the town they were pursued by the York town, which coasted up the river, shelling them on all sides, thus making the victory complete.

"After that we penetrated further into the interior and captured another small town. On our return all with the exception of two companies of the 12th, which were left to do garrison duty, commenced our journey back to Manila, where we arrived in a deplorable condition.

"On that voyage we also encountered serious difficulties. We had hardly gotten under way when the transport ran on a reef and the Yorktown had to work two days to pull her off.

RAN ON A SECONDDREEF.

"After that trouble was finally adjusted everything went smoothly for about 24 hours when the transport ran on another reef. A very high sea was running, the Yorktown being far out of sight in a dense fog, thus compelling us to lay on the reef for some six hours. When the Yorktown usually came back she was kept at work 24 hours pulling her off. Just as the transport slid off the Yorktown had had been pulling with a two-inch hawser. The Yorktown cast off as the transport was backing and before they could shut down the engines about 63 fathoms of wire cable had been wound round the propellers, which occasioned a delay of another 24 hours.

"We arrived in the city of Manila without enough clothes to be seen on the street. The people in that country not being very particular in regards to clothes it can be imagined about how much clothes we had on.

"Gen. Hall described this as the most arduous march he had ever been on in all his military career. His report of the entire expedition covered 65 pages of foolscap paper, and the time taken was 24 days.
