SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATION.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by himself, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.
Duties: Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$300 per acre.
Duties: Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to settle homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.
A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$500 per acre—Duties: Must reside six months in each three years from date of entry and erect a house worth \$300.00.

His subject will be dairying and there is no doubt better qualified to speak on this subject in the Province than Mr. Lea. It is hoped that the attendance will be very large.

Richard E. Johnson of Boston was appointed receiver for the DeLong, Seaman Co., commission merchants at 165 Milk st., by Judge Dodge in the U. S. circuit court under bonds of \$10,000. The firm, which is a Maine corporation, deals in flour, lumber, canned goods and railway ties. In the course of the receivership proceedings, which were started by Leonard A. Durston of Boston, who claims to be a creditor for \$5723, it was stated that a quantity of sardines which had been left with the Bank of Nova Scotia as security for a claim of \$38,000, had been hypothecated. The liabilities are estimated at \$118,000.—Boston Evening Record, Mar. 24. (Mr. Johnson is a brother of J. J. Johnson, K. C., City.)

The Halifax Chronicle of Monday, referring to the recent accident to the S. S. Stanley, formerly of this port, says: The steamer Stanley is lying at the Dockyard awaiting the arrival of a new tail shaft and propeller from New Glasgow. It was while ice breaking in Shelburne harbor on March 10th, that she lost her propeller, the tail shaft breaking off at the end and sinking to bottom. The Montaguey towed the Stanley here next day, and then went back on the 13th, with a diver to locate the propeller. Bad weather for nearly a week held up the search, but when the diver went down he quickly located the propeller, and it was recovered on the 24th and taken to New Glasgow. The new tail shaft will be ready in a week or so and the Stanley will go on the Slip to have it fitted and repairs completed. It was intended that after completing her work at Shelburne harbor she should break ice in the Atlantic, but that will be left to nature now. The Stanley will likely proceed to the Bay of Fundy, her station being St. John, when her shaft and propeller are fitted.
