The reserved seat tickets for the game between the Vics and Abbies in the Arena tonight are on sale at the Apothecaries Hall. The tickets are going fast and there will be a full house. Everyone should get their tickets now.

A public Forester meeting under the auspices of Court Albino, I. O. F., will be held in Eldon Hall on Thursday evening next, the 9th, inst. Chair to be taken at 7:30 o'clock. Addresses will be delivered by Rev. E. J. Rattee, S. F. Hodgson, John F. Whear and others.

At the Arena last evening there was perhaps the best ice of the season. A large number of skaters took advantage of the splendid surface and an evening of unalloyed enjoyment was spent. The popular Fourth Regiment Band rendered an especially fine musical program.

Commander Thompson, of the Marine Department, Ottawa, who has been in this city for the past few days, left last evening for Georgetown. He is obtaining an insight into the ice conditions at this time of the year and will cross on the Minto to Pictou this morning and return on Saturday.

J. D. Kennedy, O'Leary, was in the city yesterday and left last night, via Georgetown, enroute to Edmonton, Alta., after spending a few months visiting friends in this Province. Mrs. Kennedy and family remain here until March. His father, Samuel Kennedy, accompanies him to St. John, en route to New York City, on a visit to his son, Dr. Chas. Kennedy.

The second joint political meeting in the campaign in the second district of Queen's was held at Afton on Wednesday night. There was a large attendance in the spacious and well equipped hall and good order and attention prevailed through the entire meeting. The presiding officer was A. A. McNeill, Nine Mile Creek, who filled the position of chairman with entire satisfaction to all.

The meeting lasted about three and a half hours. The first speaker was Mr. Buntain, the Liberal-Conservative candidate, who made a splendid speech and received a good hearing. He dwelt on Mr. Laird's resignation, the withdrawal from capital, the alleged million dollar debt, education, taxation, cold storage, and other equally important political topics.

Mr. McPhee, the Liberal candidate, delivered a fine speech and contradicted Mr. Buntain's assertion regarding Mr. Laird's resignation. He touched on the financial situation, the educational question, the matter of taxation and other points. Mr. Matheson, leader of the Opposition, followed and treated on the question of taxation, increase of subsidy, public accounts and education, consolidation of the statutes, the Education Commission, Government's incline, provincial claims, &c. Premier Hazard followed and he also touched on Mr. Laird's resignation. He referred at length to the education question, land taxation, provincial claims, cold storage, the public finances, etc., and was heartily applauded on taking his seat. Others who followed were Thomas Doyle, Hon. John Richards, Dougald Currie, Allan Livingstone, John McMillan, A. A. McLean and D. Edgar Shaw. The meeting closed with the usual cheering on both sides.
