Labor Supply To Affect Fish For Relief Needs

(By The Canadian Press) VANCOUVER, April 16—Supply of British Columbia fish available to meet the food needs of Britain and other European countries this year will be affected directly by current labor difficulties in the fishing industry on this coast, a survey showed today.

Britain has asked for 1,500,000 pounds of frozen British Columbia halibut but because of present labor-management differences companies state they cannot guarantee delivery of any such quantity of fish, said Major J. A. Molnerwell, chief supervisor of fisheries here.

HALIFAX, April 16—(CP)—H.G. Connor, president of the Maritime National Fish, Limited, said tonight there was a shortage of skilled labor in the east coast fishing industry but there were no labor troubles that might affect the supply on fish sent overseas.

He was commenting on a Vancouver report which said west coast labor difficulties would affect the supply of British Columbia fish sent to Britain and Europe this year. The Vancouver report also said labor-management difficulties might affect delivery of Britain's requested 1,500,000 pounds of halibut.

Connor said it would be possible for the Nova Scotia fishing industry to substitute some of its haul, but for any British Columbia halibut which could not be delivered. As to the quantity of Nova Scotia halibut that might be required, the fisheries executive said "we wouldn't know about that yet."

Connor added that the Nova Scotia industry had been shipping fish to Britain throughout the war.

Says Eskimos Are Tough Poker Players
