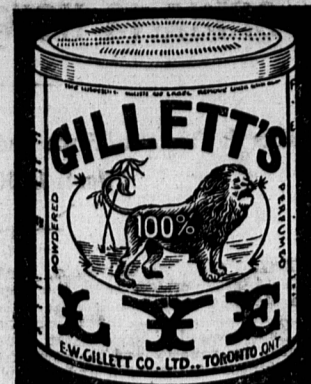
A Mount Stewart correspondent writes:—The people of Mount Stewart were greatly startled a few evenings ago to hear some one shout in the direction of the Railway Bridge that a woman was drowning. H.D. Coffin, who happened to be milking his cow in a field near-by, heard the voice of someone in distress coming from the direction of the bridge and not waiting for the second appeal Mr. Coffin started in the direction of the bridge. On his arrival he saw a woman drifting from under the bridge. Mr. Coffin then gave the alarm and not seeing anything at hand by which he could rescue the woman he decided to jump when he happened to see a boat a short distance away. As Mr. Coffin is an expert boatman he was not long in coming to the rescue. Within this time quite a few of the village people had arrived and when the boat reached the shore it was found that the woman was Mrs. Joseph Egan and that she was none the worse of her experience except a bad scare and a wetting. It is hoped some leading parties will call Andrew Carnegie's attention to this noble deed of rescue.

ARCIC EXPLORERS TO USE MONOPLANE LONDON, June 13—Australia is the latest aspirant for the honors of the antarctic discovery, and extensive preparations are being made for the expedition which Dr. Douglas Mawson will lead with the ship Aurora now sailing for London from New foundland. From Hobart, her last port of call, the Aurora will set sail toward the Antarctic region in November. Some of the best known explorers will be among the force of the twenty-five men. The most advanced feature of the equipment will be a Vickers monoplane in charge of Lieut. Watkins, who has distinguished himself at the Brooklands aviation grounds on this type of machine. "We hope the aeroplane will be very valuable to us," Dr. Dawson said in an interview. "An aeroplane can fly over an ice crevice, whereas a party on foot might have to search a long time to find a pass. There are plenty of flat snow fields for rising or alighting and an aeroplane can do a journey of 150 miles in three hours."

WANT G. T. R. TO RUN TO BOSTON. MONTREAL, June 12—Cy Warman of the Grand Trunk, has received from Boston a box containing one hundred thousand names of persons, inhabitants of the New England states, petitioning the Grand Trunk railway to extend its lines to the city of Boston. It is doubtful if such a numerously signed petition has ever been seen in Montreal before.

ONTARIO COUNTY JUDGE DEAD WHITBY, Ont., June 13—Judge Neil McCrimmon, senior judge of Ontario county, died at his home last night. Judge McCrimmon was appointed senior judge of Ontario court in 1900. He was aged fifty-six years.

PAPER-MAKERS' STRIKE FOR EIGHT-HOUR DAY. GLENFALLS, N. Y., June 12.—Three hundred employes of the Ticonderoga Pulp & Paper Company went out on strike today for an eight hour day. The men, it is claimed, have been working eleven and thirteen hours a shift. The strikers all are members of the International Brotherhood of Paper Makers.

OTTAWA RUMOR THAT PELLATT'S COMPANY WILL BUILD CANADA'S NAVY.

OTTAWA, June 12—There is an unconfirmed rumor in circulation here that the new British-Canadian Shipbuilding Company, of which Sir Henry Pellatt is chairman, is almost certain to secure the bulk of the contracts for the building of the vessels of the new Canadian navy. Tenders are in the hands of Hon. Mr. Broderick and Deputy-Minister Desbarats, both of whom are in London, where they will consult the admiralty regarding them. No official confirmation of the rumor is therefore obtainable, and the contracts cannot be awarded until the minister returns.

TO ELECT U. S. SENATORS BY POPULAR VOTE.

WASHINGTON, June 12—The senate tonight by 64 to 24 passed the

resolution amending the constitution to provide for election of senators by direct popular vote. The Bristow amendment giving to the federal government supervision of such elections was adopted 44 to 44, the vice-president casting the deciding ballot. The house has already passed the resolution.
