Grocers Must Have Coupons First

Charlottetown merchant's, laboring under the burdensome task of accepting and sorting hundreds of ration coupons daily, have been forced to discontinue the practice of collecting coupons on delivery of goods at the householders' doors.

The majority of large grocers in the city have agreed to refuse deliveries of rationed commodities unless they have received the required coupons when the order was given at their stores.

Since preserves and sweet spreads have been added to the list has become an almost impossible one. A delay of two or three minutes at each place, caused by the housewife fumbling with the ration book, has resulted in as much as one hour's loss in time during a single delivery. Sometimes an extra trip has been necessary before the coupons were collected and this presented a needless waste of precious gasoline and tires to say nothing of the time.

Commencing immediately the merchants, whose advertisement appears elsewhere in this issue, refuse to make deliveries to any household of rationed goods without presenting the coupons.
