Five dollars from the Women's Institute at Ellerslie was also very much appreciated. The Aid supplied a number of wool blankets, bed linen, table linen, pneumonia jackets and other necessities, besides furnishings for the Nurses' Home. The biggest thing undertaken by the Aid this past year was the fitting up of a delivery room in connection with Obstetrical work, which has proved most beneficial. Four nurses graduated this year and the ladies feel that on the whole the year has been a successful one. -ANNIVERSARY SERVICES - The June meeting of the W. M. S. of Trinity United Church on Tuesday afternoon took the form of an anniversary service, the subject being 50 years of missions in Japan. Mrs. R. L. Allen occupied the chair and the guest of the meeting was Mrs. Hammond Toombs, President of the Prince Edward Island W. M. S. presbyterial. The devotional program was followed by reports of the Secretary, Mrs. George Muttart, and the Treasurer, Mrs. Geo. Sheen. A duet was rendered by Mrs. J. S. Hinton and Miss Nellie Nicholson and was much appreciated. Mrs. Toombs gave an excellent talk on "The Kingdom of God Movement," which had its origin in a non-Christian land under the leadership of the Great Christian general Kawaga. She said that during the month of June, prayer would rise to God's throne for Japan from the W. M. Societies all over Canada. If the kingdom of God would come in each of our individual lives that would measure how much the kingdom would come in other lives. We should live at our best every day. The great need of prayer and being alone with God was stressed. The human soul needs to come in direct contact with God. This address of Mrs. Toombs was particularly appropriate and was eagerly listened to by all present. Mrs. Geo. Bowness then conducted a query on missionary work, their chief methods of work, the number of meetings held and etc, each question answered by different members of the Society. Mrs. C. D. McCallum then gave a short sketch of her uncle, the late Dr. Ben Chappell, who for thirty-five years laboured as a Missionary in Japan. She also mentioned the fact that Mr. Chappell's uncle was the first Methodist Minister on P. E. I. and wrote the first diary on Missionary work one hundred and twenty-five years ago; he also gave New London its name. He was a co-worker with John Wesley in London before coming to P. E. I. The Rev. Mrs. Campbell also gave a fine paper, showing the great changes internationally, socially and religiously that had come over Japan within the last fifty years. She has grown from a little known illiterate nation to one of the strongest in the world. The different status of women and children and educational facilities in Japan today were ably dealt with. Miss Martha Cartwell was the first woman missionary. She made her headquarters at Tokyo, the capital which ever since has been the headquarters of our missionaries. The meeting closed with singing and the benediction.
