materials are injurious to rope. If a rope comes in contact with water soluble materials the rope should be washed to remove the injurious chemicals.

Proper Storage - Dry rot in a rope can be prevented by storing rope in an unheated room which has free air circulation.

Cleaning a Rope - A rope which requires cleaning can be washed in clean water, washed dry the rope by laying it out on an open floor where it is coiled.

Lubricating a Rope - When ropes are manufactured they are given sufficient lubrication for the normal life of the rope, and therefore lubrication is rarely necessary.

Washing a Rope - A rope which has become dirty and rough due to very abnormal use, can be lubricated with a light petroleum oil.

Says Firms were 'Holding hands' With Hitler

WASHINGTON, April 14 (AP) - After hearing a justice department official describe pre-war agreements between German and American companies, Senator Homer Bone (Dem.-Wash.) said today that "leading American business lights had been 'holding hands' with Hitler."

The caucus committee of the senate patents committee came after John Henry Leiby, special assistant to the United States attorney general, told the committee that a patent agreement between General Electric and Krupp interests had caused a serious "bottleneck" in the production of machine tools, munitions, airplanes, tanks, armor plate and numerous other war products dependent upon hardened metal.

Leiby explained that most of the patents centered about "cemented tungsten carbide" a substance nearly as hard as diamonds and other "hard metal composition."

"Cemented tungsten carbide had been produced abundantly in Germany where it has been extensively used by German industry," he testified. "Furthermore, German industry has enjoyed the use of this material at comparatively low prices."

The anti-trust official testified these documents showed that General Electric and its subsidiary interests had secured a "bottleneck" in the production of machine tools, munitions, airplanes, tanks, armor plate and numerous other war products dependent upon hardened metal.
