THE following item from the Halifax Chronicle has been copied by the Moncton papers and the words of commendation of Superintendent Sharpe will be endorsed by those who are acquainted with the recent improvements on the Island line: "This province has recently had a visit from Mr. Pottinger, general Manager of Government Railway, Mr. W. B. McKenzie, Chief Engineer, and Mr. Simpson, his assistant. They went over the P. E. I. Railway, finding it in a most satisfactory condition under the superintendence of G. A. Sharpe. The road bed is in excellent shape, the rolling stock is well cared for and the stations, buildings and grounds all along the line gave evidence of care and progress. Under Mr. Sharpe's management a number of splendid coaches have been built in shops here—coaches which have been a surprise to strangers coming to this province, several engines much more powerful than those heretofore have been purchased, curves have been straightened along the line and the general condition of the road has been decidedly improved. In consequence of this the freight and passenger traffic have so wonderfully increased that notwithstanding so much extra expenditure and a material increase in wages to employes the deficits of the road have steadily and very largely been reduced. While here Mr. Pottinger and party visited Murray Harbor South, some three miles further south than Murray River, the point previously determined upon. The extension would be a boon to a large section of country and would also make better connection with the coast trade of King's County. They also made their first run over fifteen miles of the road, where a working train has already been installed. The general manager expressed himself as highly pleased with the condition of the work done. It is expected that the Murray Harbor Railway and Hillsborough bridge will be completed next summer. Of these more anon."
