At Fredericton, on Tuesday morning the 18th inst., after a lingering illness, Elizabeth Jane, beloved wife of John Weeks, passed out of this life to the rest and reward of Heaven. In the year 1849, she was born at Cornwall, P. E. I., eldest daughter of Charlotte and the late James Howard. She leaves a husband, three daughters, and six sons to mourn the loss of a loving and devoted wife and mother. An aged mother, and several sisters and brothers also survive her. She was brought up from infancy under the influence of christian home teaching and example. Her mind in youth was stored with precious truth, the Bible being her constant companion. As long as health permitted, she was seldom found absent from the services of the church, and was ever ready to take her part in every good work. From the time of its organization, she was a useful and faithful member of the W. M. S. at Pleasant Valley. Mrs. Weeks' home was the home of the ministers. In the midst of her family, the influence of her life was always for good. "Her children rise up and call her blessed in the name of the Lord." womanhood, and her pure character. This was clearly evidenced by the large attendance at her funeral.
