## REPRESENTATION OF MINORITIES.

At the last general election for the House of Commons some 103,651 votes were polled in Nova Scotia. This includes spoiled and rejected ballots and the cases in which as in Halifax, where the single voter cast ballots for two candidates. As is well known, all Liberal candidates were returned throughout the Province, and mostly by very handsome majorities, and yet the sum of these majorities of the Liberal members elect over the highest Conservative candidate in each case was but 779 votes. To put it in round figures, only approximately accurate 55,000 Liberal electors elected 18 members and 45,000 Conservative electors are unrepresented.

British Columbia had a similar experience in a smaller way, the Liberals making a clean sweep of that Province. Here in Prince Edward Island, on the other hand, the Conservatives secured three members out of the four, while polling but little more than half the votes. We need not go into the inequalities in the other Provinces—the two Provinces at the extreme ends of the Dominion sufficiently demonstrate that our present representative system comes very far short of being an ideal one in the matter of giving expression to the popular will.

Were Nova Scotia represented in proportion to party strength there would be seven or eight Conservative members sitting for that Province. And we think all fair-minded persons will agree that it would be fairer as between parties and better for the country all around if there were some system by which the large unrepresented minority could have adequate representation in Parliament. This subject has engaged the attention of many theorists in state-craft in years past, and both Sir Oliver Mowat and Hon. Edward Blake in Canada are on record as favoring the representation of minorities. Sir Oliver went so far as to attempt an experiment in that line in the city of Toronto, but with no very striking result.

About the only practicable plan so far devised is to group two or three constituencies together, so that each voter would have the choice of two names to place on his ballot and might if he chose give his two votes for the one man of his choice. There are, however, a number of serious objections to this, method in actual working and some better plan is sadly needed. Whoever can devise a simple, practicable and equitable plan for the representation of minorities will supply a want that has been much felt in all countries which have representative institutions.

There is something pathetic in the way the esteemed Pioneer clings to the jail in Summerside. We confess to being deeply moved by it. We had thought there were good public reasons for having only one jail for the Province, but we are half inclined to resent in view of The Pioneer's grief. "Dear to this heart are the scenes of my childhood." "In youth it sheltered me and I'll protect it now." "An institution this county has had for many years." "There is not in this wide world a prison so sweet." "You may burn, and demolish the walls if you will, but a thousand fond memories will cling round it still." When it comes to us in this fashion we have not the heart to see The Pioneer deprived of its jail. Bless its little heart!

## FOR PURE ELECTIONS.

We are glad to learn from Dr. Jenkins' letter which appears in another column of this issue that he has received a fair number of letters from citizens interested in the pure elections movement, and has called a meeting for consultation and preliminary organization to be held at the City Hall on Thursday evening next.

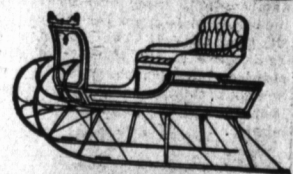
Dr. Jenkins takes care to inform all who are interested in the movement that the organization to be formed is in no sense political or partisan. Those who join in the movement will be quite as free to give their votes and support to the candidates of their choice, be they Liberal or Conservative, as they have been heretofore. Nor is the movement designed or intended to promote the formation of a third or independent party.

The sole object is to secure honest and pure elections. The organization cannot and will not become partisan. It will be an Association of men of both parties who are willing to unite in a strong effort to educate the public mind against corrupt methods in elections, to secure an honest ballot and the strict observance of the election laws.

Rain, sleet and snow have fallen in dreary succession, and in such quantity as rouses astonishment for the carrying capacity of the air to have held the enormous weight suspended above our heads before it fell. The Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick are being awakened on the prohibition question. The Island prohibitory law has evidently acted as a moral stimulant to the prohibition sentiment across the Straits. Many inquiries are being made as to how our law is working, and some contradictory reports have gone out. We believe the pulpit and press of this city and the general sentiment of a large majority throughout the Province will agree that the law has been justified by its fruits and is a long way ahead of any previous legislation we have had.

It is proposed to erect a great Y. M. C. A. building in London at a cost of \$425,000 in memory of Sir George Williams, the founder of Y. M. C. A. Associations. It will include a lecture hall, library classrooms, students' study and a laboratory and rooms for the directors and teachers, and also a complete suite of rooms for the use of the boys' section. A large number of bedrooms and residential accommodation will be provided for young men. Aid is expected from all parts of the Kingdom for this noble enterprise.

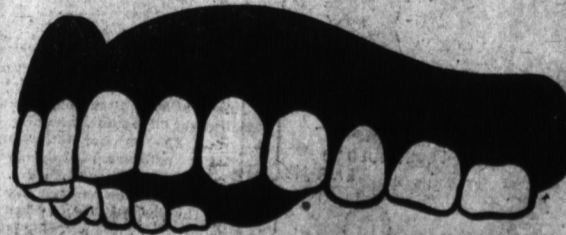
