MR. ANGUS McLEOD

In the early morning hours of Monday, December thirteenth, Mr. Angus McLeod, a very highly esteemed young man of Montague,

son of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. McLeod passed peacefully away in the P. E. Island Hospital, Charlottetown at the early age of twenty-two years.

The deceased had been in his usual good condition of health until a few weeks before the coming of the end in the earlier part of November he was taken ill with a cold. He went to Charlottetown and was under skilful treatment for some two weeks when he returned home and took up his work again. But it was not long until he was taken down with a relapse. He then went to the P. E. Island Hospital. Here it was found that the trouble had developed into a brain abscess.

Two professional nurses, namely Miss Christine McLeod, New York and Mrs. David C. Schurman, Charlottetown, sisters of Mr. McLeod nursed him tenderly throughout his illness. They seldom if ever left his bedside. All that medical skill and kind friends could do was done but all to no avail. On the above mentioned date his spirit winged its homeward flight.

On Monday afternoon a short service was held at the McLeod Undertaking Parlors conducted by Rev. W. Scott Fulton, assisted by Rev. R. H. Staver, after which the remains were taken to Montague.

Besides a sorrowing father and mother both of whom are almost heart broken, Angus leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and loving brother three brothers and seven sisters.

The brothers are John McLeod, Manitoba University, Winnipeg, and Neil McLeod, St. Stanhope McLeod, Vancouver, B. C. and the sisters are Mrs. Hugh Laurie, Port William, Mrs. David C. Schurman, Charlottetown, Miss Christine McLeod, Bellevue Hospital, New York City, Mrs. Charles Pegg, Saskatoon, Mrs. Russell Moore, Albion, P. E. I., Miss Jessie McLeod, Winnipeg, and General Hospital, Winnipeg, and Miss Florence McLeod at home.

Mr. McLeod—or "Angus" as he was familiarly known by friends far and wide—was a young man who will be much missed by all who had the pleasure of knowing him. He was deeply interested in the various social and religious activities of the community.

In the work of the Presbyterian Church he took an active part. This was especially true of the department of music. He was richly endowed with the gift of song. It was his joy to assist at sacred concerts and all beneficent entertainment and seldom was his place in the Presbyterian choir vacant.

It mattered little what duty was required of him he was always ready for it. During the earlier part of his illness he was asked if he could do a certain piece of work for the Church. He replied by saying that just at that time, he was suffering from hearing ears but that he hoped to be well by the time that he was needed and that he would do his best to have this work done. He ever sought to put God's cause first.

Although of a genial and cheerful nature the seriousness of life gripped him in his early years. While quite young he became a member of the Presbyterian Church in full communion and from time to time he spoke of how if it were possible, he would like to enter the ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

It is now evident that in the Providence of God this was not for him. He has been called to a still higher ministry.

But just why one so young, so full of promise and apparently so much needed should be thus called away seems hard for us to understand. Seeing things from the view point of our own short-sightedness we would be inclined to believe that there was surely some mistake somewhere. Yet knowing that God is all-wise and kind the loved ones with unshaken faith in His goodness shall each bow in humble submission to the Divine decree saying "not my will Oh Lord but Thine be done". Believing that what they do not know and understand now they shall know when for them the mists of earth have rolled away—when for them eternity has dawned—they will thank and praise God for it.

The floral tributes were many and beautiful. They consisted of the following:

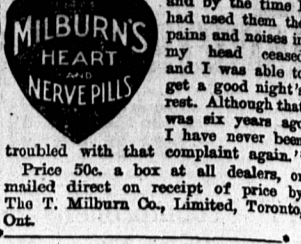

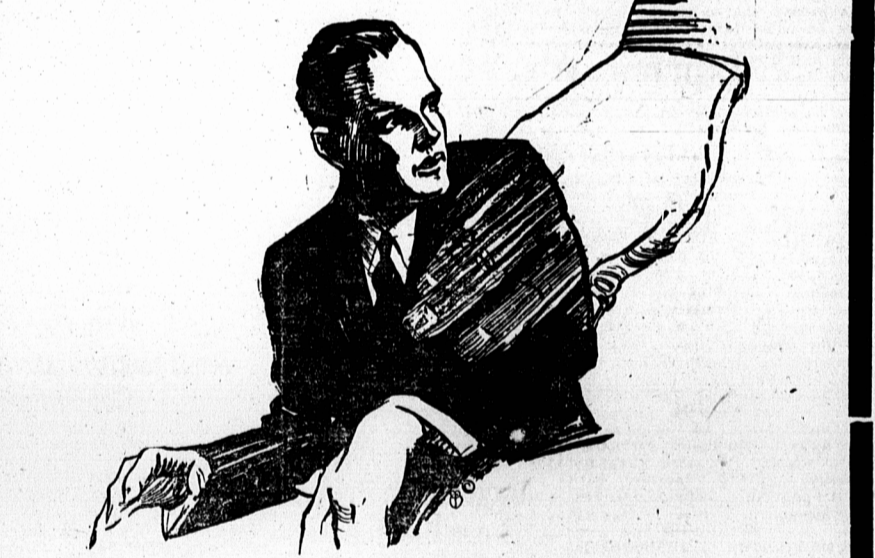

Washington Gets Official Report

(Canadian Press) WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—An official report of firing on the American river steamers Iping and Chilai at Pating, February 4th, while the vessels were enroute from Chung-King to Ichang, with American refugees aboard reached the state department today from Consul General Lockhart at Hankow. 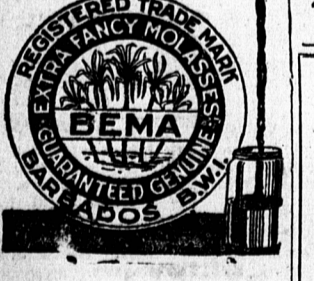
