AERIAL LEAGUE.—A meeting of Executive of the Aerial League was held yesterday afternoon in the office of the President, Mr. F. W. Hyndman. The President read a number of communications to and from Major Clayton Kennedy of the Aerial League and an interesting discussion took place on the possibilities of aerial service for this province. Mr. Hyndman is in communication with Major Kennedy with a view to a visit from the latter in the near future.

MORE FOXES TO JAPAN.—Dr. Leo Frank yesterday shipped to Japan 50 pairs of foxes from the Rosebank Ranch. These foxes for which an excellent price was received, are a prime lot, having raised to maturity 43 pups this season. Mr. John Caswell, the keeper of the ranch, will go in charge of the foxes and according to the contract which Dr. Frank has made with the purchasers, will remain in Japan for a year, looking after the animals and teaching the owners the art of ranching.

REV. MR. MURPHY IN TORONTO. A Toronto Exchange says: Rev. T. W. Murphy, the new rector of All Saints' Church, preached his first sermon to the congregation Sunday morning and the discourse ran a note of thanksgiving, also an appeal for the active assistance of his people in furthering the work of the parish. Rev. Mr. Murphy came to Toronto from Charlottetown, P. E. I., where he was rural dean and for nine years rector of St. Paul's Church. Before going East he was assistant minister at the Church of the Redeemer.

Health conditions in the community have somewhat delayed the opening of the Canadian Standard Efficiency Training courses for teen age boys in Charlottetown; but the spirit and vim with which the boys are tackling the work promises to make up for lost time. This is a week of considerable activity in Boys Work. On Sunday a number of the Sunday Schools organized classes: At St. Paul's two classes were organized.—The Trail Rangers—Chief Jack Louson, Deputy Chief, Fred Batt, Tally, Edward Owen, Cache, Willard Proctor; Mentor, Mr. Reginald Love, Taxis Boys—Pretor, Charles Palmer; Deputy, Pretor, Cambridge Owen; Scriptor, Ivan Horne; Comptor, Keith Clark. The following mentors were appointed by the boys and are asked to qualify at the coming series of training classes—Messrs J. E. Bell, George D. DeBlots, Dr. Bousfield, Reginald Lane, and H. E. Miller. On Thursday the Mentor's Training classes open in the Y. M. C. A. with supper at 6 o'clock. At 8 o'clock the same evening the Provincial Advisory Committee for Cooperation in Boy's Work will hold its annual meeting, and will be addressed by Mr. Lou A. Buckley and Mr. R. C. Sidenius, respectively, Maritime and Provincial Y. M. C. A. Secretaries, with particular interest in Boy's Work. On Friday the Boys of the different Churches will hold their opening Grand Rally at the Y; the programme consisting of a Banquet at 6 o'clock, followed by organizing work and a general entertainment, stunts, etc., winding up with some good group games.

There was a feeling of general relief yesterday when it was learned that the S. S. Enterprise had reached Souris at 7 o'clock that same morning from the Magdalen Islands. The steamer left Souris last Friday and her delay in returning caused considerable anxiety.

BRIGHT PROSPECTS.—The fox business on P. E. I. certainly looks bright for the near future, the Prime Quality Silver Black Fox Company, Kensington, recently sold a bunch of pelts in London, at an average of \$631.00 each the pelts all being of Foxes under nine months old.—R.

SEED FAIR.—A meeting of the members of the committees of the Maritime Winter Fair was held in Summerside on Thursday afternoon and the members arranged the program of the Fair; also elected the judges for the different sections of grain, etc. A number of exhibits have already been received and the prospects of the fair are bright.—L.

THOSE FOXES FOR JAPAN.—The number of foxes shipped to Japan by Dr. Leo Frank was 10 pairs not 50 pairs as given in error in yesterday's Guardian. These foxes had been selected by Dr. Leo Frank himself, the purchasers leaving the matter to his best judgement. Dr. Frank states that he respected this confidence and hopes to make further shipments to the same consignee in the near future. Already he has had several enquiries from Japan.

WELL-KNOWN HERE.—New York papers devote considerable space to the trial in that city of Elizabeth Bakes, charged with the murder of Mrs. Helen Hamel. Against a chain of circumstantial evidence her leading counsel, Mr. Thomas C. McDonald is directing the main attacks. A certain local interest is attached to the case from the fact that Mr. McDonald is so well known in P. E. Island. His wife before marriage was Miss Agnes Malone of South Melville where her brother and sister still reside. Each year with their son they spend the summer at the old home on the Melville Road.

There was general regret expressed in Charlottetown yesterday when the sad news became known that Mr. Peter Doyle, one of the city's best known postal couriers had passed away after an illness of only one week of influenza and double pneumonia. Deceased was 32 years of age and was held in high esteem by all. Since entering upon his duties as a letter carrier in 1907 he discharged his duties faithfully and well and made many warm friends. It will be remembered that some years ago Mr. Doyle had a very narrow escape from death when four of his comrades lost their lives by the upsetting of a boat off Rocky Point, he being the only survivor. He was a son of the late Mr. James Doyle of this city and he leaves to mourn, a widow, a bride of only two months, (see Miss Gertrude Hennessy), and his mother and four brothers, viz: Dominic of the police force, Stephen and Joseph of this city and James residing abroad; also one sister, to all of whom deepest sympathy is extended in their time of sorrow. The funeral takes place this morning at 8.45.

Mr. J. E. Wyatt represented the Attorney General who is absent from the province. The Grand Jury found true bills against William J. Jones for assault intending bodily harm and Peter G. Gallant for incest. His Lordship delivered an exceedingly eloquent address to the Grand Jury in which he dealt with the present war situation. He reminded them of the noble sacrifice which the province as a whole in common with other parts of the Empire had made in the great struggle and he made a fervent appeal for the support of the Red Cross and Patriotic funds which he said had a vast responsibility in providing for the families of those brave sons of the island who had represented their country in the fight for democracy. There are six civil jury cases on the docket.
