Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by mail may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. ERMINE. (32,789 Skins). 25 per cent higher. A mixed offering with a fair percentage of Russians. All qualities advanced the better grades, however, being in best demand.

FISHER. (365 Skins). 35 per cent higher. A very good offering consisting principally of Northeastern skins, which were used except for and fetched very satisfactory prices.

BLUE FOX. (1,181 Skins). 20 per cent higher. A representative collection consisting principally of Greenlands, of which 94 were dressed. The pale skins sought comparatively the better prices. Notwithstanding the large collection the market showed itself fully able to absorb the same.

CROSS FOX. (600 Skins). 10 per cent higher. Principally Northwest Canadian skins which were in excellent demand.

GREY FOX. (5,751 Skins). 40 per cent higher. A general collection which was in good demand.

RED FOX. (9,871 Skins). 20 per cent. Chiefly American and Canadian with a few skins of Russian, all of which sold at satisfactory prices.

SILVER FOX. (471 1/2 Skins). 15 per cent higher. An average collection including more than the usual number of pale skins. The medium grade fresh skins sought comparatively the best prices.

WHITE FOX. (1,329 Skins). 15 per cent higher. A rather poor collection of Alaskan and Russian skins, consisting of quality, brought good prices.

AUSTRALIAN FOX. (5,050 Skins). 25 per cent higher. An average collection with all grades in good demand.

KOLINSKY. (13,446). 20 per cent higher. A mixed collection of Russian and Korean skins which sold at market prices.

LEOPARD. (452 Skins). 20 per cent higher. A varied offering of the better grades were well competed for, all varieties advancing equally.

LYNX. (10,738 Skins). 20 per cent higher. A good collection of Alaskan and Canadian skins. Although this article had been somewhat neglected during the late fall, an improved demand developed, which was sustained throughout the entire offering.

MARTEN. (3,826 Skins). 15 per cent higher. A very good collection of Alaskan, Hudson Bay and British Columbia skins which aroused spirited competition. The dark skins were especially sought after.

MINK. (53,618 Skins). Northern 60 per cent, Southwestern 25 per cent. A general collection consisting in part of pale skins all of which brought satisfactory prices. The fresh Northern and Eastern met with strong competition.

MUSKRAT. (402,420 Skins). 60 per cent higher. A good collection. All grades and sections shared in the advance, which is attributed both to the strong demand and the apparent shortage of the present collection.

MOLE. (180,655 Skins). 10 per cent higher. An average collection consisting principally of Scotch with a few lots of Dutch which brought full market prices.

NUTRIA. (28,976 Skins). 60 per cent higher. A varied collection. The high prices anticipated for this article were fully realized.

AMERICAN OPOSSUM.

(94,573 Skins). 40 per cent higher. A good collection which induced animated competition and realized prices, which if anything exceeded expectations.

AUSTRIAN OPOSSUM. (34,586 Skins). 60 per cent higher. An average collection which was well competed for and in which the advance was sustained on all grades.

OTTER. (1,292 Skins). Northern 20 per cent higher, Southern 40 per cent higher. A general collection which sold well. The Southern were in exceptional demand.

RACCOON. (35,759 Skins). Northern 15 per cent higher, Southwestern 35 per cent higher. A small collection consisting chiefly of Southern skins, which advanced relatively higher than the Northern sections. The market was prepared to take a larger offering.

SABLE (RUSSIAN). (278 Skins). No change. An average collection of Kamtschatka skins which met with ready sale.

SQUIRREL. (48,310 Skins). 40 per cent higher. An indifferent collection in which the best sections were missing, but which nevertheless fetched high prices.

SKUNK. (63,482 Skins). Northern and Eastern 20 per cent higher. A good offering, the quality being better than usual at this time of the year due no doubt to weather conditions and to restrictive game laws. All sections and grades participated in the advance. The demand for this article among consumers apparently justified the speculative market.

WOLF. (16,195 Skins). Northern 25 per cent higher, Southwestern 10 per cent higher. A collection consisting principally of Western and Northwest skins which excited brisk competition throughout. Almost the entire collection was bought by the manufacturers.
