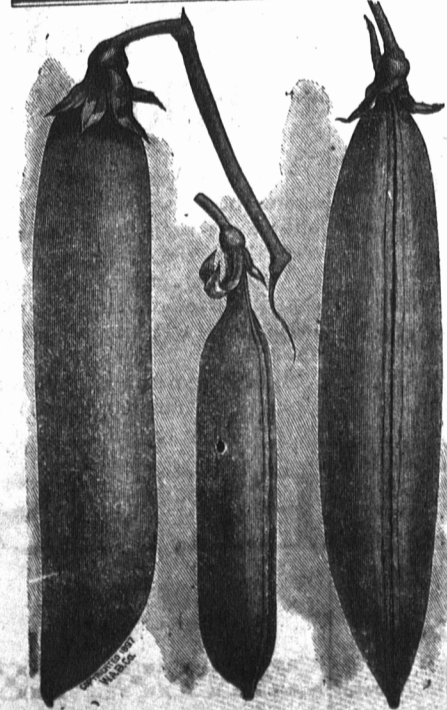

THIRTY THOUSAND JAPS LANDED NEAR PORT ARTHUR

The Russian Stronghold now Shut in by Land and Sea—Landing Effected Under Guns of the Fleet at Three Points Forty Miles from Port Arthur—Russian View of the Situation.

PORT ARTHUR ISOLATED.

LONDON, May 6.—(Special)—Official advices show and the Russians admit that Port Arthur is now practically cut off by land.

THIRTY THOUSAND JAPS LANDED.

The Japanese have landed a big force, said to be thirty thousand men, near Pitsewo on the Liao Tung peninsula at its narrowest part, about 40 miles from Port Arthur.

LANDED AT THREE POINTS.

It is said the Japanese landed at three different points on the west side of the peninsula, under cover of the guns of their warships.

PORT ARTHUR WELL PROVISIONED.

The Russians say that Port Arthur is well provisioned and they do not think the Japs will try to storm it.

RUSSIANS WERE NOT IN FORCE.

The few hundred Russians at the landing place retired before the bombardment of the Japanese ships and then the transports landed their armies.

RUSSIANS FORCE AT PORT ARTHUR.

It is believed there are 23,000 Russians at Port Arthur with the bottled up fleet.

[The above despatch shows the Japanese plan of campaign rapidly developing. Having driven the Russians out of Korea they will now invest Port Arthur by land. It is a bold venture to land a force of thirty thousand between Port Arthur and its strong garrison on the one side and the strong bodies at Russian troops up the railway line, at New Chwang (150 miles) Mukden (200 miles) and Harbin (350 miles) away, probably totalling 150,000 men. Doubtless the Japanese force will be rapidly and greatly strengthened hereafter. By landing at the narrow part of the peninsula, not more than three quarters of a mile in breadth there, the Japanese commander will be able to not only cut off Port Arthur from the main Russian force to the northward, but also to so fortify the narrow neck of land that with the aid of his fleet, whose guns will command the isthmus, he can hold up any Russian force sent to attack him and relieve the beleaguered city. Still the movement is a bold one, almost to the point of audacity. Doubtless it has been well considered as all previous moves in the war game by the Japanese have proved to be.]
