THE PHONE NEWS AGENCY.

In the city of Budapest, capital of Hungary with some 600,000 people, there has been established an agency for the distribution of local, telegraphic and general news, which is to some extent a competitor with and rival to the modern newspaper. Its methods are described by Mr. Thomas S. Dennison in the World's Work. To begin with, there is a separate telephone system in Budapest devoted to this enterprise, having all the rights of an ordinary telephone company as to the location of its posts and wires about the streets. There are 6,200 subscribers to the system. The company collects news by all the agencies of the modern newspaper, reporters, telegraph messages, &c. At stated hours during the day and evening from 10.30 in the morning till 10.30 in the evening, the news is transmitted from Central to all the subscribers who choose to listen to it. The time for giving out each class of news is scheduled and tables furnished to each subscriber, as for instance the stock quotations at the time of opening and closing the stock exchanges. A reader called a "Stentor," with exceptional vocal qualifications, reads the news into a central receiver from which it is transmitted to the subscribers, each of the latter being furnished with a pair of receivers similar to those used by the young persons at Central.

There are some obvious drawbacks to the system as compared with the newspaper, and some obvious advantages in favor of the phone system. An extra can be issued at any hour of the day. A fire, or a battle is in progress, and at half hour intervals if necessary the news is transmitted directly to all the subscribers. Of course there is no record of the news, and subscribers are simply told what is going on. If they wish to refer to any particular matter afterward they must depend upon memory. We conclude therefore that the phone news system can never wholly take the place of the newspaper. Nevertheless Mr. Dennison tells that the enterprise is distinctly a success in Budapest. It has passed beyond the region of experiment and will no doubt be extended to other large cities.

Russia is now the greatest oil-producing country in the world. Last year her oil production was over two billion imperial gallons, or 120,000,000 gallons more than the United States. There is apparently no limit to the production. In the Baku region many wells start out with a flow of 100,000 barrels a day, and one is reported which produced 4,000,000 barrels in less than 40 days. Of course it is usual that the flow greatly falls off after a time. The American system of piping the oil from the place of production to the port of shipment has been in operation since July last. Oil is more and more coming into use as fuel in generating steam for marine and locomotive engines, for factory purposes and for heating houses.

The recording office in Dawson City shows unabated interest in mining. In three months past there have been 1,500 relocations of claims and 750 new locations, from which the receipts of the office were \$40,000. Of miner's licenses 1,300 were issued in the same period, yielding \$13,000.

The manufacture of the cable to be laid between Canada and Australia will be commenced next month. It is to be laid and in full operation by December 1902.

The Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba who was in Toronto ten days ago stated that the prospects of the Prairie Province were never brighter. When he left Winnipeg they were enjoying bright spring weather, with dust blowing on the roads and the farmers busy seeding. Never were more acres ready for planting and never were so many persons turning their faces toward the Canadian Northwest. The growth of Winnipeg has been rapid and steady and a vacant house is almost unknown.

But little has been heard of late of the once much talked of oil fields of Gaspe. Now the Canadian Trade Review tells that operations are to be renewed on an extensive scale. Rival companies have been combined in a trust. A very large amount of money has been expended, over \$3,000,000 in all, in exploring and developing the oil country, building a refinery, laying down conduit pipes &c. The refinery has a capacity of 1,000 gallons a day. The oil can be pumped from a very large area and is said to be of a quality equal to the best American oil.

In Hamilton the other day at the opening of the spring assizes Mr. Justice McMahon strongly resented the charge of the Hamilton Spectator that Judges travelled on railway passes. He said this was a grave charge against the honor of the Bench, and he strongly resented it. He denied that Judges of the higher Courts of the County Courts accepted or used railway passes, and said if the newspaper charge were true it would reveal a most deplorable state of affairs. "It would be deplorable that any Judge should so besmirch the ermine as to be guilty of such an offence and it was to be hoped that any Judge who had ever accepted a railway pass would never try any case in which the owners of a railway were interested."

ROYAL RESIDENCE IN IRELAND COMMENCED

LONDON, April 17.—According to Onlookers, a society paper, a site of 145 acres has been acquired in Ireland for the erection of a royal residence, the plans of the building have been approved of and work will commence shortly.

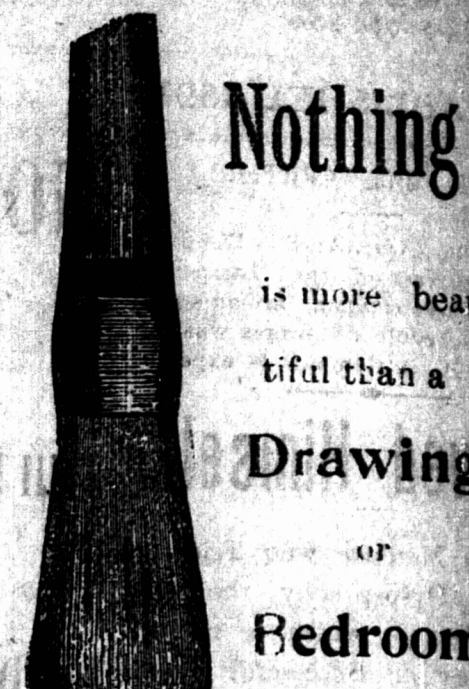
