GOVERNMENT WILL PAY FEW REIMPT OF SOLDIERS.

OTTAWA, Jan. 9.—Militia orders contain an announcement of interest to the clergy. It is a notification that when the attendance of troops at services of any denomination is considered by officers commanding at a station to be necessary, clergymen may, on recommendation of that officer, be paid at the rate of \$2.50 per annum for each officer, non-commissioned officer and man of the permanent force professing himself a member of the denomination to which the clergyman belongs. This rate shall be in full payment of necessary pew accommodation, and in consideration of the discharge of all clerical duties. The order applies to both Protestant and Roman Catholic clergy.

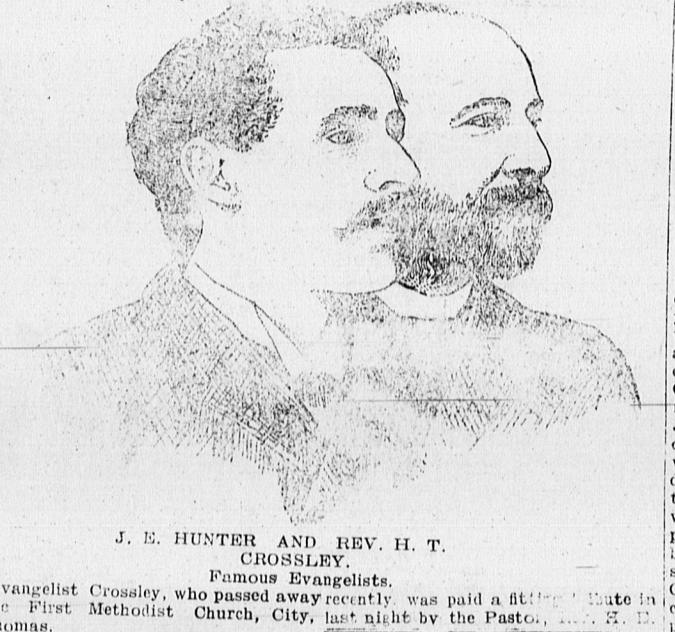

THE LATE JAMES HODGSON

Your kindly words of appreciation of the deceased recall the memory of other days. It is more than thirty years since I first met him. At one time or a little before he was one of a noble class of men who were teachers of Bible Classes in the Brick Church as it was then called. For fully developed Christian character James Hodgson did not take a second place among a class of men to whom Charlottetown is greatly indebted. He was not given to much talking in church meetings, but his words were well chosen, and his reputation for things honorable was a "above" reproach. When an inspiring sight there was in the Men's Bible Classes. It is doubtful whether any church in the Maritime Provinces at present with all the aid from the Men's Bible Class movement has anything to compare to what could be witnessed every Sunday in the Brick church. Other teachers of Men's Classes were Rev. F. Smallwood, E. W. Moore, George Moore, Wm. E. Dawson, Wm. Shepherd and Wm. Heard. And now Mr. Hodgson is the last to pass away. But the good that he did remains. Blessed is the memory of such a man. About the time that I first met him there were nearly fifty Sunday School Classes connected with the Church.
