SELLING MANHATTAN'S SKYLINE

NEW YORK, Sept. 2.—Selling Manhattan's skyline at fifty cents a look has developed into a big business in the financial capital of the world. It got its start eighteen years ago when Leopold Jonas sold his theatre tickets agency, leased the tower of the new Woolworth Building and began charging thrill-seekers for the view. It reached a new peak recently when twelve thousand persons paid half a dollar apiece to travel in express elevators up seventy-one stories to the observation of the Chrysler Building and gaze out over New York and its environs from a point 783 feet above Forty-Second Street.

In the same week between 700 and 900 persons a day visited the Woolworth Tower, a little more than 750 \$t up, and some hundreds more ascended the crest of the Chanin Tower, 650 feet above the pavement, or the tiny glass-enclosed gallery of 9 feet over Wall Street.

Leopold Jonas is the biggest figure in the skyview business. The Souvenir-Shop-in-the-Clouds Corporation of which his son is president, leases the Woolworth Tower, and he himself is president of the Metropolitan Vista Corporation which holds the case on the Manhattan Company tower. In addition his unusual Photographs Reproduction Company holds the franchise for the distribution in North America of five-cent picture

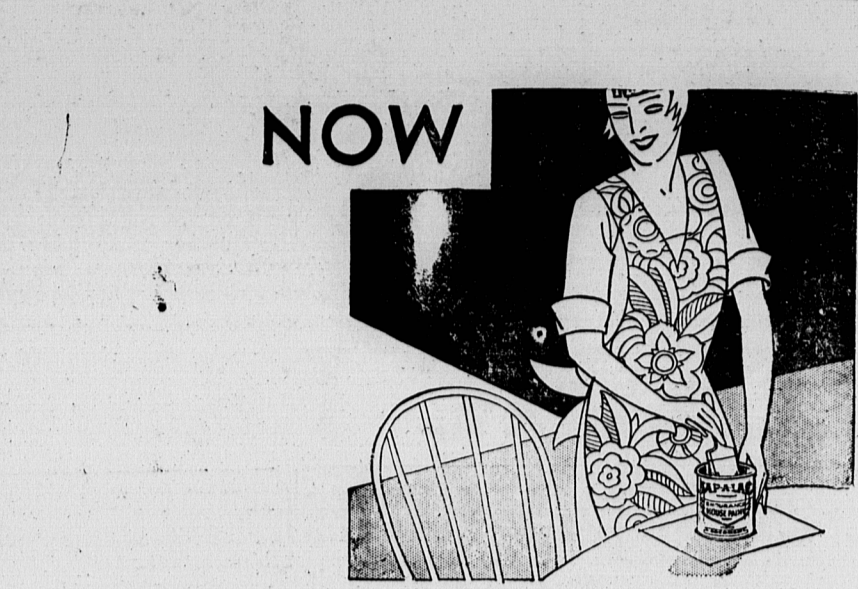

postcards of New York views, sold in that she was not meant for the stage she went into a play called 'White Collars'. She was a hit. Then offers came from other producers, and she was a success in each succeeding role. Richard Dix persuaded her to become his leading lady, and she was taken from that role to play in a Broadway musical comedy. Now she's to be starred in her own right on the stage, and she'll appear in talkies, too.

For several years she has been married to Neal Andrews, a million-aire manufacturer.

The owners of the Chanin Building operate its tower more for the advertising than as a money maker but even so, the Chanin Tower will bring in about \$10,000 a year in fifty-cent pieces, its owners say. The observatory is operated by a subsidiary when Walter P. Chrysler goes up there he can see his country home, out at Great Neck, Long Island. The Manhattan Company building has a commanding view of the harbor, bringing the Statue of Liberty right at one's feet. The Paramount Building, over at Forty-Third and Broadway, is supreme in Times Square. Its observation tower is only 445 feet above the street, so it charges but twenty-five cents for the view.

Mr. Jonas, now 78, is regarded as an expert in the skyline business, and is often consulted by persons about to open observation towers on top of skyscrapers in other cities.

"We find," said one of his associates, "that foreigners are interested in our skyscrapers but that American tourists get their big thrill out of the harbor. Most of them have never seen the ocean before."
