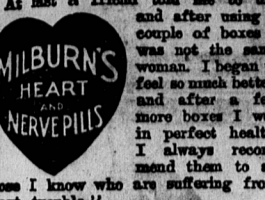

NEWEST NOTES OF SCIENCE.

Twisting the handle opens and closes the jaws of a new adjustable wrench.

The Danish state railways will experiment with motor train service on their lines.

Resembling a gas room heater of the recent type is a portable oil burning gasolene.

Estonia's deposits of oil shale are believed to contain five billion metric tons of rock.

With a new airplane camera clear photographs have been made at an altitude of five miles.

Chemists have succeeded in obtaining helium from hydrogen in Germany in minute quantities.

A new signal for street traffic includes lettered disks, colored lights and a warning bell.

Switzerland serves 97 per cent of its population with electricity obtained from water power.

An old warship of an experimental type has been converted into a floating hotel at a Florida resort.

Australia last year increased its production of wool about 35,000,000 pounds from the previous year.

To protect the motors in cold weather of a felt and asbestos lining for automobile hoods has been invented.

The Syrian city of Aleppo is to have a street railway, an electric plant and a modern water supply system.

Golf and bowling have been combined in a new game, the pins being knocked down with putting shots with golf balls.

Telephone calls requiring the prepayment of charges by the insertion of coins or tokens are being introduced in France.

Ventilators that admit air but exclude water feature a self balancing float that a Seattle inventor has designed.

An Austrian engineer's rotary gasolene motor is featured by an absence of loss of power when the motion is reversed.

A sealed air space between the metal lining and wooden covering helps to keep the water warm in a new washing machine.

Of English design is a radio receiving set with its parts housed in wicker boxes that form the arms of an easy chair.

About 4 per cent of all shipping under construction throughout the world at the close of 1926 was of the motor driven type.

A large plant has been built in Berlin to make gun cotton, artificial silk and other useful products from the city's garbage.

An eight cylinder automobile motor invented by a resident of Brooklyn, N. Y., lacks connecting rods, wrist pins and crank case.

The number of telephones in the Irish Free State has increased to nearly 25,000 and a rural system is in process of formation.

After the creases have been dampened, trousers are pressed without heat by a new frame that can be hung in a wardrobe or closet.

A farm rake developed by a French inventor has three rows of forks mounted on a drum that revolves around the axle of the machine.

Inner soles to lengthen the life of shoes and add to the comfort of wearers' feet have been invented that can be removed and washed.

India produces from 65 to 70 per cent of the world's supply of sheet mica, most of it obtained from mica about 200 miles from Calcutta.

A small motor drives a new circular saw for cutting ice that is mounted on sled runners and drawn forward by the traction of the saw teeth.

An English inventor's camera for photography notes on the margin of the film the time, angle and altitude at which each picture is made.

Small enough to be laid on the edge of an ash tray, a new cigar lighter automatically switches on electric current or its work as it is lifted.

By alloying aluminum with other metals a German claims to have produced scratch proof automobile bodies that have a finish resembling porcelain.

That Prohibition in this area is a complete failure, enforcement a travesty, the public a victim of poisonous liquor, is the conviction that the New York Herald Tribune draws from the Norris report, which it accepts as "official, im-

personal, unbiased." In a somewhat louder tone the New York World declares that "Prohibition enforcement is a failure and a farce, and the poisonings and deaths from the use of alcohol are in the main traceable to the alcohol poisoned by government order."

On the latter theme, the New York Evening World goes further, saying: "The Government is directly responsible for this poisoning that menaces the health of the people of the United States. It is that Government which is poisoning the alcohol supply for multifarious industrial uses. It is that Government which has made the medicinal supply of liquor so costly and hard to get, as powerfully to induce adulteration with the wood-alcohol denaturants prescribed by that Government for grain alcohol. It is that Government, in other words, which stands out today as the greatest worker ever known for undermining the health of its own people."

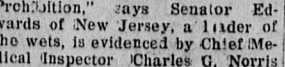
For a vigorous statement of the dry view we must go to the Prohibition-enforcement officials and organizations. Says Dr. Francis Scott McBride, General Superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League: "Of course, there has been an increase of alcoholism in New York City since 1922. That was the year Governor Al Smith helped to hoist the red flag of the bootlegger over the Statehouse. He, in effect, issued an invitation to the liquor outlaws of the nation to come to New York when he signed the bill to repeal the State enforcement code."

Mr. Chester P. Mills, Prohibition Administrator in New York, declares that he shares Dr. Norris's view on the deadly effect of bootleg liquor and the difficulties of enforcement without State cooperation, but suggests that the State, if so wishes still has ample power to stop the poisoning complained of. He continues: "The speakeasies of New York are not only violating the national law, but other laws for which they could be closed by local authorities. Among others, I might mention the health law, which require the registration and examination of individuals handling food, and the various nuisance laws. If these State statutes are inadequate to cope with the situation, the Prohibition Act itself gives the State authorities a forceful weapon."

That Dr. Norris's figures confute themselves is the contention of S. E. Nicholson, of the Anti-Saloon League. Mr. Nicholson declares that for the eight years prior to 1918—the period of license as he calls it—the number of alcoholic deaths averaged 619. But in 1918, 1919, and 1920, the years when Prohibition was enforced most strictly, he says, deaths from alcoholism fell to 252, 176, and 98, respectively. "That alcoholic deaths have increased during the last four years," he declares, "is not due to Prohibition, but to open rebellion against the law."

Lime, the soil where the larkspurs are to go, both annual and perennial.

Get ready for the early radishes. In rich, moist soil some of them will mature in three weeks, the quickest vegetable there is.

Soak spinach seed in warm water for several hours before planting. It will hasten germination materially and spinach needs speed to develop good leaves.

You can start eggplants in pots to good advantage in a sunny window, one eggplant to a pot. Don't get any manure in the soil around the eggplant unless very thoroughly decayed.

Clean off the garden early and save the vegetable refuse for a compost heap to go with the autumn leaves and lawn clippings. Treat it with the new synthetic manure compounds and by mid-summer you will have a fine supply of humus to spade in. It will also make a valuable late summer mulch.
