Will ask recount In Quebec election

ST. JOHNS, Que., Oct. 9—(CP)—The St. Johns-Napierville seat in the Quebec Legislature for which a by-election was held Monday, was retained in the Liberal Government column by a margin of 21 votes on the basis of an official revision day count today.

After the slips showing the total vote in each of the polls had been added up, returning officer Louis Lord declared L. Omer Perrier, Liberal, elected with 6665 votes compared to 6644 for his Union Nationale opponent, Paul Beaulieu.

Oscar Gagnon, K.C., representing Mr. Beaulieu, immediately announced that papers would be served tomorrow asking for a judicial recount of the ballots.

St. Johns-Napierville was one of two by-elections held Monday in which women voted for the first time in a Quebec provincial contest. In the other seat, Huntingdon, Denis J. O'Connor, Liberal, was elected by a majority of more than 1200 over John W. Stewart, Union Nationale.

Both seats were formerly Liberal and the vacancies were caused by the deaths of the sitting members.

Souris Native Reads paper at Ottawa meeting

LONDON, Ont., Oct. 9—(CP)—The Roman Catholic Church in Canada has become "freer, more independent, more active and stronger than under the French kings," according to a paper by Gustave Lanctot, Dominion archivist, presented before the French section of the Canadian Catholic Historical Association today. The paper was read by Seraphin Marion, in the absence of Mr. Lanctot.

The paper reviewed many aspects of church history and concluded that under Gallieanism, which Mr. Lanctot defined as the principles enunciated by the declaration of the clergy of France concerning ecclesiastical power, in the French regime the Catholic Church was closely watched by the state.

"The British conquest in that respect was the liberator of the servitude of Gallieanism. Under British rule the Catholic Church in Canada became freer, more independent, more active and stronger than under the French kings..."

A paper by Rev. D. J. Rankin, on "Lawrence Kavanagh, winner of emancipation in Nova Scotia," was read by Dr. Emmett Mullally, Montreal, a native of Souris, P.E.I.
