SHORT COURSE A SUCCESS.—A most successful series of meetings were held at Elmsdale and Great Point during the past week. Short Course in Agriculture especially at Elmsdale when despite the intense cold there was scarcely a standing room at the evening meetings. The interest at O'Leary was good but the attendance was not so large. The Com. of Agriculture met each place and also attended a meeting at Springfield, Lot 8. His remarks were based chiefly on the value of live stock farming to those in the immediate vicinity of the farm. The Commissioner is a practical dairyman and has by feeding the crop together with large quantities of feed rich in protein made his farm very productive. He thus explained how this could be done at a profit and at the same time dispense with the heavy cost of commercial fertilizer. The discussion brought out many good ideas. The other members of the staff assisted by speakers from the Live Stock Branch, Ottawa, and the Experimental Farm at Mr. Poirier of the Dominion Dept. Charlottetown had equally successful meetings. This week Short Course will be held at Rollo Bay and Elmira where it is hoped they will find a large attendance.

WEATHER RECORD FOR 20 YEARS.—By Hon. Mr. Justice Fitzgerald. Sir.—Looking at the records of the thermometer kept by me, and taking those of the last twenty years I find that January of this year has been much the coldest, and "the oldest inhabitant" is quite right in calling it the most severe in his experience.

My self-registering standard thermometer registered as follows in these years:—

Table with 3 columns: Year, No. of days zero and below, Coldest day. 1920: 20, 18; 1919: 14, 14; 1918: 14, 14; 1917: 8, 16; 1916: 6, 18; 1915: 6, 13; 1914: 4, 6; 1913: 2, 5; 1912: 12, 13; 1911: 6, 15; 1910: 2, 1.

(This year but little snow and open boats crossed from Rocky Point to town Feb. 14.)

(There was no snow this year and no sleighing until 17 Feb., but little after.)

(Ferry steamer running intermittently until 30 Jan.)

(This year very little snow ran until 19 Jan. and little or no sleighing until 19 Feb. with much rain.)

We may expect a continuance of this cold wave for some days yet, as the first week or ten days in February have almost invariably been as cold, if not colder, than the preceding January; indeed, in 1904, 1907, 1911 and 1913 there were in February in these years eleven days when it registered zero and below, and in 1914 fourteen days, 1917 nine days and in 1918 eleven days; and constantly registering the lowest temperature of the year.

WHY NOT A SALVAGE PLANT?—Sir.—In your issue of this date containing reference to the "La Canadienne" and her work, it is stated that she is to proceed to Sable Island to attempt to salvage the steamer beached there, also that this is the first time that an attempt has been made to pull a steamer off the island.

In this connection the following may be of interest:—

In the fall of 1894 the British steamer "Nerito" stranded on the south side of Sable Island, and on receipt of the news in Halifax, the steamer "Lunenburg" was ordered to go to the island and bring off the crew, the writer going as pilot and requested to report on conditions.

Had action been taken promptly the "Nerito" could then have been easily floated.

An attempt was made later, to float her by an expedition from the "Meritt Wrecking Organization of New York," commanded by Capt. Fred Sharpe, but as winter had then set in the work was postponed until the following spring.

In the spring work was resumed, and as time passed, the writer, then master of the salvage steamer "Rescue" was requested by parties interested to proceed to Sable Island in connection with the ship. I resigned my command and left Halifax for Sydney, N.S., to meet the Dominion Government steamer "Newfield," placed at my disposal for the time by the Department of Marine and Fisheries, through the Halifax agent, Mr. J. Parsons.

Before leaving Sydney for Sable Island, I received a telegram advising me that the "Nerito" had been floated and had arrived in Halifax Harbor conveyed by a salvage steamer.

I returned to Halifax and boarded the "Nerito" and she proceeded to New York under her own steam. She was later sold to the "Miami Steamship Company, the writer remaining in the employ of the Merritt Company. This company was the most successful and best equipped concern in the salvage business, sending their boats and

salvage captains anywhere, and under any conditions. To mention a few ships salvaged during the time I was thus employed, the following are a sample. The "Nerito," 3000 tons; Sable Island; "Asturian Prince," 3000 tons, off Curacao Island, coast of Venezuela, 75 per cent. salvage; "Irrawaddy," Jersey coast; American Liner "St. Paul," Jersey coast \$100,000 salvage; "Lamington," Long Island coast, and many others.

Salvage captains such as Fred Sharpe, the Tucker Brothers, Nelson, David Wolcott and others became superintendent for another company.

And now, Sir, for a pull for P. E. Island. We have here first class mechanics, a splendid plant for repairs, such as the Bruce Stewart Co.; seamen second to none, central location for the whole Gulf of St. Lawrence, keen enterprising business men; then, why not a well equipped salvage plant here?

Such a plant could be busy the whole summer in the Gulf, and when the navigation closes, the terms are one unit in salvage plant being always on board) could be stationed in White Head Harbor, which is open, centrally located for work east or west of Canada. This is a golden chance for P. E. Island, and worthy of consideration.

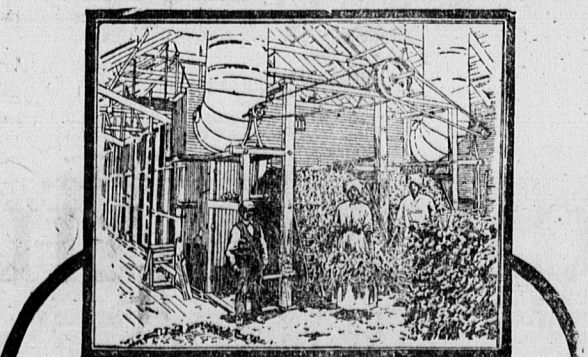

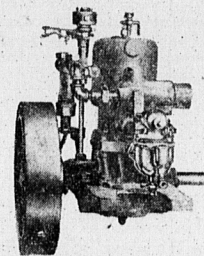

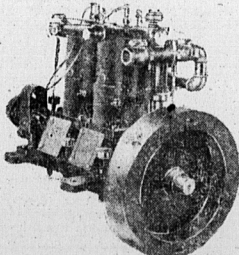
