Wellington Subdivision C. W. L.

Following is the report of Mrs. Emily A. DesRoches, Recording Secretary, presented before the Wellington Subdivision C.W.L.:

"Madam President, Reverend Chaplain and members of the Catholic Women's League. As Recording Secretary of the Wellington Subdivision, C. W. L. it is my privilege to submit for your consideration my annual report for the year ending April 30, 1948.

Membership: We have a paid-up membership of one hundred members including seven new members. During the year we held eleven monthly meetings and nine executive meetings with a fair attendance at each. Magazine: We have six paid-up subscriptions to the League magazine which is regularly distributed among the members. Publicity: All meetings were promptly reported in the press. All correspondence has been duly attended to.

Citizenship: Members assisted the Mobile X-Ray Unit during their clinic in our community. We helped the Canadian Legion, the Holy Name Society, the St. Thomas Aquinas Society and the School Building Committee with all their entertainments. We sponsored a Baby Clinic and helped the newly-organized Boy Scouts to raise funds. At the Diocesan Convention in Charlottetown, we were represented by a delegate and by our Diocesan convener of the Sisters of Service. We sent a delegate to attend a special meeting of the T. B. League in Charlottetown. We have decided to give our support to the Girl Guides which is being actually organized in our district. We assisted at the Children's Annual Picnic at the beach.

Social Service: Donations have been sent to the T. B. League, Red Cross, Sisters of the Precious Blood, Sisters of Service, St. Martin's Building Fund and the C. W. L. Diocesan Fund. Transportation was provided for the children attending Christian Doctrine classes.

Boxes were sent to the Sisters of the Precious Blood at Christmas and at Easter. Necessary clothing was provided for some children making their first Holy Communion. We also supplied all church music. We paid for the laundering of church linens, and provided a new altar cloth for the altar in the chapel. We furnished flowers for the altar. We bought oilcloth for the church. Our members assist in teaching Christian Doctrine on Sundays and at school. We bought cutlery and kitchen utensils for the parish hall. We helped to clean the church and decorate the altars for Corpus Christi, Forty Hours Devotions, Christmas and Easter. Masses were offered for the members of the League and for the dead of the parish on All Souls Day, also in honor of our Patroness, Our Lady of Good Counsel. Messages of sympathy have been extended to the bereaved members and during the past year we were called upon to bear the loss of a faithful member. We presented a gift to our Chaplain at Christmas. We sponsored a Handicraft Course of six weeks which was largely attended by the pupils after school hours and by the members in the evenings. At the closing of our course we held a farewell party for our instructor and presented her with a gift of appreciation.

Education, Scholarship, and Study Clubs: We visit our schools monthly and prize for Christian Doctrine were donated, also prizes to pupils making the highest standing in Grades 8 and 10. We have contributed to the St. Dunstan's Scholarship Fund. We have a Study Club which meets monthly, is fairly well-attended and deals primarily with religion, education and community matters. It has been our aim to keep abreast of modern trends in reading and to help curb the flow of immoral literature and so we have appointed a censor to make occasional visits to the local library.

Funds were raised to carry on the work of the subdivision by card parties, bingoes, and a bazaar. We also received two cash donations. Our treasurer's report shows that all Diocesan and National obligations have been met. It also shows receipts for \$68.30 with disbursements of \$85.71 leaving a balance on hand of \$90.59. Our thanks are due to our Chaplain Reverend Father Gillis, for his interest and guidance in our work. We are thankful also to him for the privilege and convenience of holding the executive meetings in his office, to the hall committee and the press for their cooperation and to all who helped to make the past year a very successful one.

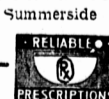
