Padlocked French Paper Re-appears MONTREAL, March 9 (CP) - Combat, French-language leftist weekly whose offices were padlocked a month ago, reappeared in Montreal today, distributed by mail. The one-sheet issue, of standard newspaper size, was printed on both sides. It proclaimed it was "printed under the padlock law" and carried a caricature of Premier Maurice Duplessis and a leading article attacking him. It also carried news of labor bodies. It was Premier Duplessis who ordered closing of Combat's offices and an end to its publication in Montreal. He acted, in his capacity as Attorney-General, under Quebec's so-called padlock law that permits closing of places suspected of Communist activities. The paper was dated "Montreal, March 6". It reached local newspapers and the Montreal office of the Canadian Press by mail today. The envelope bore a one-cent stamp with pre-cancelled revenue number 3900. There was no cancellation showing point of origin. The address, apparently typewritten or mimeographed, was on a small piece of paper pasted on the front of the envelope. Paul Benoit, officer of the anti-subversive squad of the Provincial Police, said the issue was printed at the shop of Eveready Printers, Ltd., 78 Wellington St. West, Toronto. The issue itself gave no hint where it was printed.

Canada's Adverse Trade Balance Up OTTAWA, March 9 (CP) - Canada's adverse trade balance with the United States climbed to \$45,300,000 during January from \$35,900,000 during December but still was down more than \$10,000,000 from the January, 1947, total, official figures showed today. At its low January level, the deficit still was reflecting the Government's dollar saving measures, including import prohibitions and special excise taxes, which were launched Nov. 17 and began to show their effects in mid-December. The January total compared with an adverse balance of \$79,800,000 in November, \$86,200,000 in October and \$73,800,000 in September. The adverse balance for the whole of 1947, created by Canada's growing shortage of the U.S. dollars totalled \$918,100,000.
