Ontario Leads In H. I. P. Loans

OTTAWA, Feb. 15.—(CP)—Finance Minister Dunning announced today 1,173 Home Improvement Loans for \$460,832 were approved in January bringing the total to date to 62,472 loans for \$24,940,879.

Ontario led all provinces in January with 406 loans for \$231,971 while Quebec was second with 161 for \$81,066 and Alberta third with 114 for \$51,592. Loans and amounts in other provinces in January include: Prince

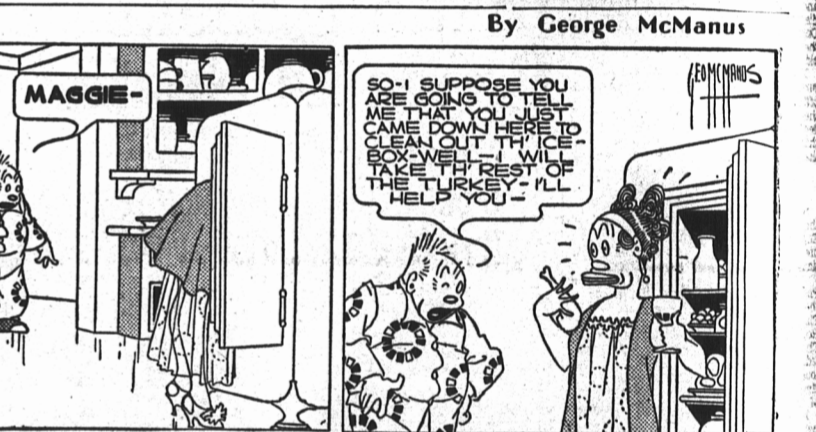
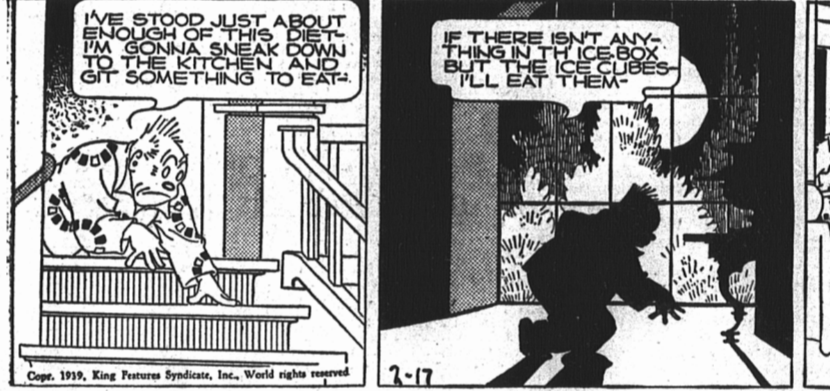

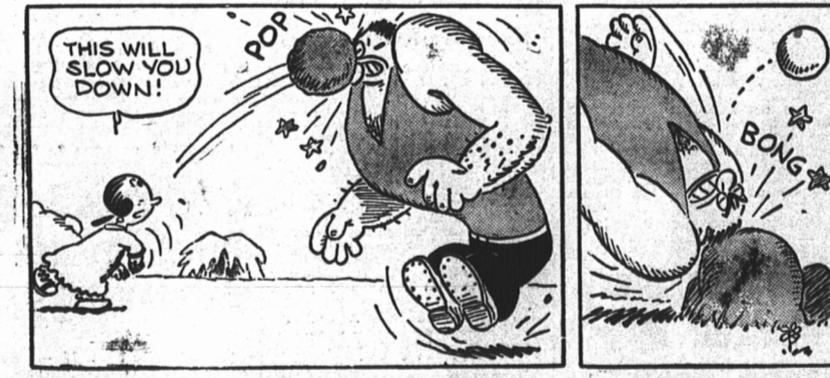
