HISTORY OF THE NAVAL AIGUILLETTES
 It is believed that aigillettes are of feudal origin, and were first brought into being as a badge of office when the horses of an army chieftain and his immediate entourage were picketed close to their tents during a camp. It was the duty of one of the retainers to take up the picket ropes and pegs after the remainder were mounted and carry them until they were next required. These ropes were worn round the body, with the pegs hanging down, and the chief could easily be located by the proximity of his henchman, who was thus at hand when they eventually came to be regarded as a badge of office of one of the personal staff, and superseded the sash. PREPARE FOR BIG POST-WAR DEMAND
 LONDON, Feb. 2 (CP) — The Council of Clothing Trade Associations, in a report made public here, predicted nearly 1,000,000 people would find work in the British clothing industry after the war. This would be an increase of 300,000 on the pre-war total.
 The council recommended that the clothing coupon technique be made to increase a national minimum standard for the first months of peace but said the number of coupons available increased as supplies became available.
