Scout News and Notices



Viscount Alexander, Chief Scout for Canada, will officially open the first Canadian Boy Scout Jamboree at Connaught Camp, 12 miles from Ottawa, at 11:00 a.m. on July 18.

Actual registration of Scouts commenced on the first Canadian Jamboree now taking place in Quebec, 175. By provinces they are: Newfoundland, 44; Prince Edward Island, 34; Nova Scotia, 194; New Brunswick, 215; Quebec, 150; Ontario, 106; Manitoba, 108; Saskatchewan, 107; Alberta, 212; British Columbia, 445; La Federation des Scouts Catholiques from the Province of Quebec, 175; and the Boy Scouts of America, 110.

Jet aircraft will zoom over the first Canadian Boy Scout Jamboree at Connaught Camp on the mornings of July 19 and 20 when No. 410 (F) Squadron, R.C.A.F., present special displays through the courtesy of the Minister of National Defence, the Hon. Brooke Claxton.

Special bus trips to acquaint the Jamboree Scouts with Canada's Capital are being arranged. Each day, from July 19 to 22, some 700 Scouts will leave the camp at 9:00 a.m. to visit the Parliament Buildings, the War Museum, the Dominion Archives, the R.C.A.F. Station at Rockcliffe, the National Museum and the Dominion Experimental Farm. Each Scout will also have free time to shop and tour Ottawa before returning to camp at 5:30 p.m.

Special "Jamboree" trains from Vancouver, Calgary, Toronto and Truro will carry Scouts to the First Canadian Jamboree in addition to the hundreds of Scouts who will reach Ottawa by regular trains and other means of transportation. Boy Scouts from the United States will enter Canada from Troy, N. Y., Detroit and at Sault Ste. Marie. Upon arrival in Ottawa the Scouts from the Jamboree trains will be transported to Connaught Camp. A number of special buses chartered for the purpose.
