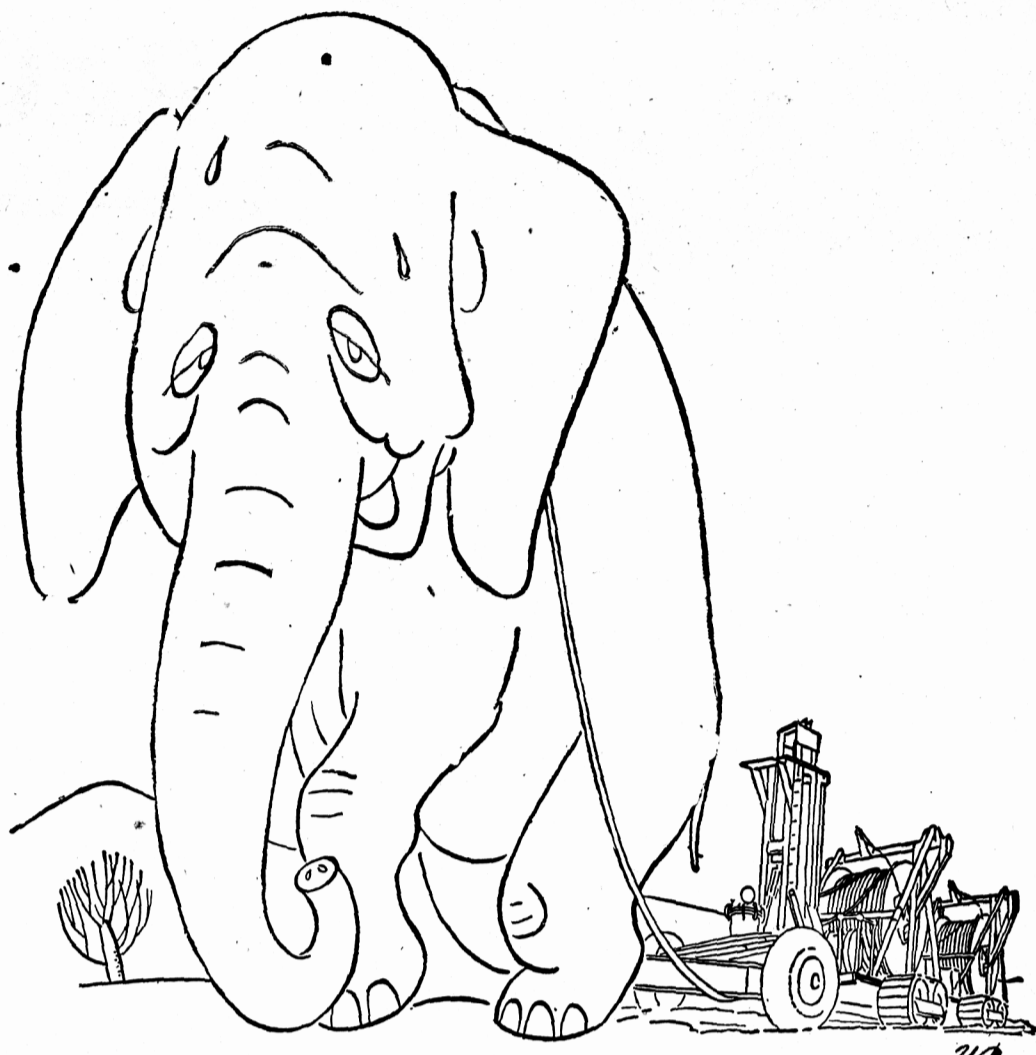

FATHER AND SON OPEN THEATRE IN O'LEARY

The successful attempt made by a P. E. Island father and son combination to rehabilitate themselves is featured in the current edition of Veterans Affairs, an Ottawa publication for veterans. It tells the story of Milton Smallman of O'Leary, and his son, Ralph, who have built a fine theatre with a seating capacity of some 500 persons.

Smallman senior had thoughts of continuing in his "forges" trade of diesel fitting while Ralph had thought of working in a garage, but opportunities in both trades appeared to be limited, so they looked around for some other field, and noted that the people of O'Leary had to travel some forty miles to Summerside for theatre entertainment. So they decided to provide entertainment nearer home.

credits they had over \$4,000 to start building an attractively-designed theatre with a seating capacity of 500. Labor was scarce so most of the construction was done by themselves—including installation of plumbing, heating plant and air-conditioning system. To erect their building and install equipment took nearly a year but since their opening in January last year they have seen their efforts crowned with nothing but success. With a schedule of four shows a week, they have been playing to consistently good houses.

"With a limited capital with which to get started, the partners were constantly waiting for ways to economize in the construction and equipment without making sacrifices to the comfort of patrons. By building their own seats they were able to save \$1,600 on this one item alone but air conditioning was a 'must'.

"While engaged in erecting and equipping their venture, both father and son were granted assistance through awaiting returns allowances. Since becoming established, both have repeatedly expressed their appreciation to the department for this assistance without which they would have been unable to rehabilitate themselves in the new project."
