MRS. ALEXANDER SUTHERLAND

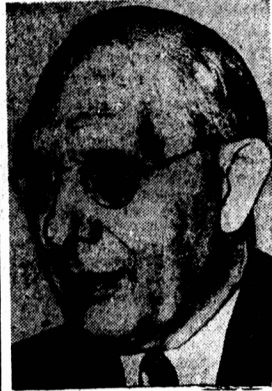
