Former Consul Of Netherlands Dead

MONTREAL, Nov. 17.—Hon. Stephen Beverly Howard, late consul for the Netherlands in Montreal, retired Montreal importer and a member of a distinguished military family, died here on Saturday. He was 83 years of age. After being consul for the Netherlands in Montreal since 1879, Mr. Howard retired from office in 1922. During this term of office he was decorated by Queen Wilhelmina with the Order of the Roanoke (Nassau), which conferred the title of Honorableness.
