NORWICH, Nov. 18.—The question of woman suffrage was discussed at the annual National Unionist Conference, which opened here yesterday, when Lord Robert Cecil tried to obtain a pledge from the delegates to extend the Parliamentary franchise to women.

LA LIBERTAD (San Salvador, Nov. 18)—The Banco Nacional has suspended payments. It is not connected with the government in any way. The remaining banks have satisfied the government regarding their stability and are absolved from the obligations to change their notes to silver during the next six months.

CAIRO, Nov. 18.—There is a serious diversity of opinion between the estimates of the cotton crop by the Alexandria Produce Association and the Agricultural Department. The former put the coming crop at 7,000,000 cantars (693,000,000 pounds), estimated by the latter.

ROME, Oct. 31, (Special)—Professor Beni, who is carrying out excavations in the ruins on the Palatine Hill, has located the imperial palace of Nero and Caligula—Caius Caesar—and also that of Domitian, of a slightly later period, the foundation of the imperial throne being recovered.

LONDON, Oct. 31, (Special)—The policemen of London have become incensed with the trade union germ, and a provisional committee drawn from their ranks is busy today enrolling members in what has been named the Metropolitan Police Trade Union.

PARIS, Nov. 18.—The French Cabinet has approved the recommendation of the Finance Minister for the issue of \$260,000,000 of perpetual three per cent. government rentes.

BERLIN, Nov. 18.—Count Georg von Huelssen-Haeseler, Director of the Prussian Theatres, made a vigorous defence of his moral character before the law courts here in the hearing of a suit for libel brought by him against Herr Steinhilber and Herr Wilde, editors of the Montags-Zeitung.

The newspaper mentioned had published early in August an article connecting the name of Count Huelssen-Haeseler with the allegations made some years ago against Prince Philipp zu Eulenburg and others of Emperor William's suite, asserting that he had narrowly missed being involved in the great court scandal.

When the Crown Prosecutor suggested that the suit be tried behind closed doors in the interests of public morality Count Huelssen-Haeseler emphatically and successfully objected, declaring it necessary once and for all to put an end to these stories which had been in circulation for six years.

The Count then read under oath a sweeping declaration that he had no perverse inclinations or thoughts and that such ideas were most repulsive to him.

The defendants did not attempt to substantiate their allegations, and the outcome was that Herr Steinhilber was sentenced to a year's imprisonment in a penitentiary and Herr Wilde was acquitted on the ground that he was only nominally responsible for the libellous article.

MUNICH, Nov. 8, (Special)—The insane King Otto of Bavaria has been deposed from the throne of the Kingdom of Bavaria, which he has occupied for twenty-seven years without being aware of his position, and Prince Regent Ludwig proclaimed himself King in his place, in pursuance of the provisions of a law just passed by the two houses of the Bavarian Diet.

The new King is to be known as Ludwig III. A royal proclamation, which has been posted throughout the kingdom declares inevitable the insanity which has incapacitated King Otto from ruling, and states that in consequence of this Prince Regent Ludwig has brought his regency to an end, has ascended the throne and nominated himself King.

In his proclamation Ludwig III. alludes to himself as "King by the grace of God."

Two members of the Bavarian Diet were yesterday sent as a delegation to Fuerstenried Palace to see the mad King Otto. They found him, according to their report, in a pathetic condition, and when he saw them he stammered some inarticulate words. When they withdrew from the room they heard a great crash, and on going to see what had caused it found that King Otto had dashed to the floor a tea tray which had been set for the Deputies and had smashed all the costly porcelain.

The deposed King Otto was born on April 27, 1848, and succeeded his brother, Ludwig II., who drowned himself in Starnberger Lake on June 13, 1886.

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 8, (Special)—The body of Mr. Price Collier, the American author, whose death occurred at Vedlesborg Castle, on the island of Funen, has been brought here. It was accompanied by Mrs. Collier and her son, Mr. Warren D. Robbins, Third Secretary of the American Embassy at Paris. A brief service had previously been held in the castle chapel.

The funeral party was met at Copenhagen by the American Minister to Denmark, Mr. Maurice F. Egan; the members of his staff and several friends. According to Mr. Robbins his stepfather had expressed a wish that his body be cremated, and his family has decided to follow out his desires. The cremation will take place at Copenhagen.

ROME, Oct. 31, (Special)—The excavators have come upon seven houses of the republican epoch, a complicated network of pipes and drains and several circular rooms cut in the Tufa stone and lined with plaster to protect from dampness.

LONDON, Oct. 31, (Special)—The policemen of London have become incensed with the trade union germ, and a provisional committee drawn from their ranks is busy today enrolling members in what has been named the Metropolitan Police Trade Union.

Every member of the force below the rank of superintendent is eligible for membership, and the men are joining in such numbers that the organizers anticipate that the union will be strong enough by Christmas to force the authorities to recognize it.

The metropolitan police force at the end of 1912 consisted of 33 superintendents, 608 inspectors, 2,687 sergeants and 17,011 policemen, making a total of 20,339, but this figure has been somewhat increased this year.

BERLIN, Nov. 18.—The retirement of General Huerta from the Provisional Presidency of Mexico is now the surest way to restore order in that country, where German interests are so great, according to an editorial article in Tagblatt, which heretofore had steadily attacked the policy of the United States in Mexico. The newspaper greets with sympathy the report that Admiral Von

Hintza, German Minister to Mexico, has advised General Huerta to accept the American proposals. The Tagblatt's previous hostility to the United States is explained in the concluding paragraph of the article, in which it speaks to the possibility of the Monroe doctrine whose political power is now, it says, stronger than ever before, assuming an economic aspect, and urges Europe to be on its guard against any attempt to introduce it into the Mexican business field.
