wholesome selected foods. The milk is drawn from the cows and passed directly into a pail through a strainer made of two layers of cheese cloth between which is placed a thin layer of absorbent cotton. Grated bottles are provided to contain sufficient milk for one feeding. They are sterilized and then there is placed in them ingredients for mixing the food according to a prescribed formula. The milk is drawn from the pail through a faucet near the bottom direct into the bottles. The bottles are corked immediately and sealed with wax. They are then distributed according to orders. This ensures a sanitary food for the infant, scientifically prepared and in proper quantities. It has minimized the labor of those who are responsible for the care of infants and has greatly reduced the percentage of infant mortality wherever it has been used.

The salient features in my address to which I wish to direct special attention are:  
Keeping up the Dispensary.  
A Tuberculous Colony.  
Inspection of milk and other food products.  
Soliciting financial aid from the Provincial and Civic Governments.  
I would recommend that you elect as your President for the ensuing year a member of the medical profession. In matters of health recommendations coming from a doctor appeal to the people with greater force than they do coming from a layman. whose knowledge from a pathological view point must necessarily be of a very precautionary character.
