BOSTON, Oct. 26—Thomas Nixon Carver, professor of economics at Harvard University, and one of the most able writers on economic subjects of the day, in a newspaper article, printed recently, says it is not in the interest of society or the laboring classes that men who cannot earn \$15 a week should try to marry and bring up a family in a place like Boston.

SNOW STORM TIES UP WEST

Train Service Beyond Winnipeg Paralyzed By Blizzard.

WINNIPEG, Man., Oct. 26—One of the worst snowstorms that has ever occurred in the west is now at the height of its fury, and has completely demoralized the services of the C. P. R. and C. N. R. trains.

LIBERAL MAJORITY IS NOW FORTY-SEVEN

Seven Provinces Give Liberal Majorities and, Two Go Conservative, The Great West Divides—Effort Made to Unseat Stratton, Liberal in Peterboro.

MONTREAL, Oct. 27—(Special)—According to the latest returns yesterday's elections resulted in the return of 129 straight Liberals, 84 Conservatives and two Independents, with six seats yet to elect.

SARNIA, Oct. 26—The body picked up in the river near St. Clair, Mich., recently by Frank Currier, captain of a ferry boat, has been identified as that of Albert Martin, aged 21 years, of Corunna, Ont., eight miles from here.

NEW RAILWAY HAS OPENED

TOKIO, Oct. 26—The Formosa Trunk Ry., which recently was completed, was formally opened today in the presence of General Prince Kanmu of the Japanese army and a large number of officials and especially invited guests.

TERRIBLE HARDSHIPS, INDIAN AND SQUAW

Adrift in an Open Canoe For Thirteen Days. Picked up by the Steamer Dara After an Incredible Experience. Ate Fish Left by Animals.

VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 27—A despatch from Ucluelet says the two Indians lost from the sealing schooner Thomas F. Bayard, brought by the schooner Markland, Billy and his kiootchman, Louise of Kyngnot, had an awful experience, being adrift in an open canoe for thirteen days with only three sea biscuits as food for ten days.

LONG DROUGHT DRIES STREAMS

CARDINAL DIED AT TOULOUSE

LONDON, Oct. 26—Cardinal Francois Desire Mathieu, former Archbishop of Toulouse, France, died in this city today. The cardinal was a delegate to the Eucharistic Congress held in London last summer. He became ill here and underwent an operation shortly after his arrival. He was born in 1839 and was created a cardinal in 1889. He was a member of the French Academy and had a seat also on the Tribunal Segnatura at Rome.

AMOY, China, Oct. 26—The Tao Tai of Amoy was interviewed today regarding the revolutionist plot to assassinate Chinese officials during the stay here of the American warships which was unearthen last week. He said that every precaution to prevent trouble had been taken.

BANK AT ST. RAPHAEL

MONTREAL, Oct. 26—Advices from St. Raphael, some fifty miles below Quebec, say that the branch of the Provincial Bank there was broken into and the sum of four thousand five hundred dollars carried off. The Bank is insured against all loss and the Provincial Detectives are after the robbers who are known to be the same gang operating in the Eastern Townships and Quebec for some time past.

SIX SHEEP HERDERS ARE MISSING

SANTA FEE, N. M., Oct. 26—Twenty thousand sheep, grazing on the Cumbres Mountain range in Rio Arriba County, one hundred and forty miles north of here, are reported to have perished in the blizzard which has raged in that section during the last three days. The storm is the worst in years and snow is from five to ten feet deep. Besides the great loss of sheep, six herders are missing and it is believed they were also frozen to death.

ZEPPELIN AGAIN MAKES A FLIGHT

FRIEDRICHSHAVEN, October 26—Count Zeppelin, in his reconstructed airship, the Zeppelin L, made his first ascent recently. He rose to a height of two hundred metres. The ascent was in every way a success. Ten passengers made the ascent and they remained up three and a half hours. The balloon made an average speed of twenty-nine and one half miles an hour. Driven alternately by a single motor and then with both motors, the dirigible made easy progress and seemed in entire control of the aeronaut.

KIDNAPPED AT MONCTON

MORE REPORTS ABOUT TYPHOON

Which Caused Eighty Hundred Deaths and Property Loss of a Million.

MANILA, Oct. 27—(Special)—Official despatches from sections visited by the typhoon recently place the death list at 800 and the damage to property at \$1,000,000. There were no reports of damage in Isebella province.

JILTED, HE TRAMPS WEEKS IN TRANCE

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 26—Thrown into a trance by the refusal of his sweetheart to marry him, Merton A. Swartz, an athletic young fellow, walked from Philadelphia to Boston in two weeks, although absolutely unconscious of his surroundings or the roads he was taking.

CAR CRASHED THROUGH A FACTORY BUILDING

TORONTO, Oct. 26—Recently a number of workmen employed by the Phillips Manufacturing Company, on Carlaw Avenue, had a narrow escape from death. A grand Trunk crew were engaged in placing cars on a siding which runs close by the Phillips' building.

GIRL DIED FROM SMOKE POISON

PORT ARTHUR, Ont., Oct. 26—Terrible forest fires in this vicinity are responsible for at least one death, though under somewhat remarkable circumstances. The victim was Miss T. M. Scott, who died in the hospital from smoke poisoning as a result of her system becoming saturated with the smoke at her home where she was surrounded by fire for several weeks.

PENNY TELEGRAMS FOR THE EMPIRE

LONDON, October 25.—The proposal to establish a telegraph rate of a penny a word throughout the empire will be advanced a step at a meeting to be held in the Royal Colonial Institute on November 10, at which the Earl of Jersey will be chairman. Mr. Hemmiker Heaton and others consider the plan quite feasible, and believe it will be carried out much more easily than the system of penny postage was. In Australia a telegram can be sent 3,000 miles for a penny a word, and it is maintained that but for political frontier telegrams could be sent from London to India, a distance of 3,200 miles, at a similar rate.

ENCOURAGEMENT TO ALL HENS TO LAY

No More Egg Yolk Can be Imported From China to This Country.

NEW YORK, Oct. 26—The World today says: Official action was taken here yesterday, calculated to encourage the American hen. There has long been a controversy between importers and the Government regarding the admittance into this country of so-called egg-yolk. On Collector of Customs Fowler's order 1,200 cases of the yolk were taken out to sea and dumped yesterday. For many years large importations of egg yolk had been received at this port from China. The material had a wide use and, therefore, should not be considered as conflicting with the provisions of the Pure Food Act. One application after another failed.

GRAVENHURST IS IN GREAT DANGER

GRAVENHURST, Ont., Oct. 26—Forest fires that crept almost to the heart of the town during the past few days, and which were fought off by heroic efforts of volunteer brigades, today destroyed cordwood on the farm of H. R. King, near the town, to the value of hundreds of dollars, and burned fences and standing timber. Mr. Simpson, another farmer, suffered a loss of about \$500 in wood. Only by continuous and strenuous fighting was the fire held in partial control, but as the day advanced the wind shifted, and late to-night had veered almost completely around, burning the flames back over the town seems now out of danger.
