

Increase the Yield
SIX (C. E. MacKenzie)

There is probably no way in which the farmer can increase the yield better than by keeping down the weeds as it takes as much from the soil to grow one stack of weeds as it does to grow one of grain. The old saying "The early bird catches the worm" should be changed to "the early man catches the weeds" and at a time when they are easily killed and have not taken much from the soil therefore the liberal use of the harrow, weeder, cultivator, spud and the hoe should be the motto of all progressive farmers. Anyone having had turnips to hoe knows what it means to kill weeds as soon as they show themselves above the ground and never letting them get a start.

Occasionally on account of poor seed germination is slow; this gives weeds a chance. Then haying etc., comes on and a few rows are left to hoe when weather is not suitable for haying.

Weeds soon form a perfect mat and it takes as long to hoe one row as it should have taken to finish three or four. Experience of this kind should be a lesson and shows that by getting at them when small saves times and kills more weeds at a smaller cost.

What methods should we use to destroy weeds those of us having silos and planting corn should use the harrows almost every other day until the corn is up like weeds with the potato field. It is surprising how many weed roots one sees after one cut of the harrows on the potato field. Another reason is that the frequent cultivation helps the crop when it most needs it.

Turnip ground may be harrowed and then plowed, worked again left for a few days again after the weeds brought to the top sprout work the ground again.

The more the ground is cultivated before seed is sown the smaller the number of weeds we have to get clear of later on.

Weed fighting must extend further than the root fields to fence corners and roadsides as well. The farmer having sheep might do worse than let them run on grain and root fields until they are seeded as sheep are splendid weed destroyers and by so doing you save the pasture fields for a time when they can get a start that will help later on.

Early fallow is good for many of our noxious weeds but remember that summer fallow should be thoroughly worked.

The best part of this war on weeds should be got through with early in the season therefore cultivate early and often.

The only remedy for thistles in grain fields is the spud and this should be got through with when the grain is too short to hide the thistles.

Let us use this method of increased production and hoe, harrow and plough. Do it early. Do not give these enemies time to entrench, advance on them at the double quick when they are small and then the mastery will be complete and sure.
