RECIPROCITY DISCUSSED.

Before the Canadian Club of Boston on the 4th instant addresses of more than ordinary interest were delivered by Hon. Henry R. Emmerson, Editor Williston of the Toronto News, and Hon. Henry M. Whitney of Massachusetts. Judging from the full reports printed in the Boston papers we infer that both Messrs. Emmerson and Williston acquitted themselves with credit and that their addresses profoundly impressed those present. Mr. Emmerson's address we think to be one of the best ever delivered by him. It is broad, comprehensive, patriotic and friendly. It must have pleased the Canadians present and there was nothing in it at which citizens of the United States could take offence. He showed very clearly that it is not by the fault of Canada that we do not have freer trade relations with the Republic, and also made it clear that Canada is now so prosperous, self-reliant and hopeful as not to be troubling herself on the subject.

Mr. Whitney is an earnest advocate of reciprocity and the recent elections in his state have demonstrated that there is a strong feeling in Massachusetts in favor of that measure. He claimed to know the opinions of Canadians pretty well and argued that the feeling in favor of freer trade across the border, would speedily regain the strength it had years ago, when the people on both sides came to understand each other better and realise the mutual gains that would result from reciprocity. But Mr. Whitney ought to realise in a manner that he does not that Massachusetts is not the United States, and that there are powerful highly protected interests in other states which would prevent any terms of reciprocity being offered that Canada could or would accept. Such is the firm conviction of the Canadian people today and that is the reason why they have dropped reciprocity from their minds and are making themselves busy with other and more promising projects.

The assassination of General Sakaroff, a former Russian Minister of War, is another startling incident in the disturbances, riots, strikes and revolutionary movements which afflict that distracted country.

Just what President Roosevelt intends to do or recommend Congress to do in the way of measures to control and regulate the great trusts is not quite apparent from the synopsis of his message which has reached us. What we have seen of it deals in carefully balanced generalities.

A great deal of maudlin sympathy is being wasted over the case of Mary Rogers of Vermont who murdered her husband and is very anxious to escape the penalty. We are strongly of the opinion that a woman who murders her husband should be punished precisely as a man who murders his wife should be punished.

Messrs. Mackenzie and Mann of the Canadian Northern tell of having laid 650 miles of track during the year, and this is a record for these great railway builders. Next year they hope to do quite as much. At this rate it will not take them long to complete their line from ocean to ocean. This is big business.

THE INTERCOLONIAL.

It is satisfactory to read that the deficit in the operations of the Intercolonial during the first four months of the current year falls slightly under \$60,000. If an equally good showing could be made during the remaining nine months of the year the annual deficit would be reduced to \$180,000, but, of course, this is too much to expect. The winter months involve larger cost of operation in proportion to traffic receipts than the summer months. Passenger receipts fall off because there is less travel. On the other hand there are fewer trains and less work is done in ballasting and track repairing and the outlay is thus diminished during the cold season. There is, however, great cost incurred in snow-clearing after winter storms and much loss from interrupted traffic. But, after making due allowances for the uncertain chances of the coming winter we think there is good prospect of a much better showing for the road than was made in two years past. The determined and well-considered measures of the Minister and his staff to reduce the cost of operation are evidently bearing fruit.
