(By The Canadian Press) MONTRÉAL, July 28.—Capt. Arthur Tache, who last November became head of the Montreal morality squad with the assignment of cleaning up gambling in the city, resigned today after a suspension order by Director Fernand Dufréne. Capt. Tache, who goes on pension after 32 years' service, is succeeded by Lieut. Gabriel Piche. Capt. Tache's resignation came four days after the slaying of Harry Davis, recognized as a leading gambling operator in the city. Dufréne had resigned through deeply grateful to all those who helped in making this occasion a memorable one. - S.

There were well-authenticated reports today that the underworld boss, who admitted shooting Davis in the latter's Stanley Street betting place, claimed he shot in self-defence. The Citizens' Vigilance League came back into the general picture today with the statement by one official that through investigation during August into vice and crime will be sought. The league last fall, in the midst of a crime outbreak in the city, called for action, claiming there was corruption in the police department, that tips on raids were given in advance and that bribery was widespread.

## Stimulate Lagging Appetites

It often seems, in the sultry days of summer, that the members of the family lose part of their enthusiasm for food. In the case of the children this may be due to the fact that the regular routine of school days is changed. They are more interested in playing than in eating and they find it hard to coax them to the table. When this happens it is time to start thinking of food that will stimulate the appetite on sight and at the same time be easy to prepare. For the cook must consider herself also. Sliced salads of either fruit, vegetable, meat or cottage cheese do not require much time for preparation and can be very attractive. Meat loaves are also an easy hot weather dish. With an abundance of fresh fruits, desserts may be simplified and consist of raw fruits or of simple fruit desserts of ice cream with fruit sauce. Vegetables are also plentiful. Vegetable-pilates, raw or cooked can be served as a main dish. Several vegetables may be cooked in the same kettle, thus using only one burner and reducing the heat in the kitchen. Plan to use the oven for more than one dish at the same time. Something for supper to be served cold, may be cooked at the same time as the main dinner dish, preventing heating the kitchen twice in the day. The following recipes have been tested by the home economists of the Consumer Section in Canada's Kitchen in the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

## CHERRY WHIP

1 cup sour cherry pulp (about 2 cups whole cherries) 2 eggs whites 1/2 cup sugar Pinch of salt Wash stem and pit cherries. Force through a sieve or crush to a fine pulp. Beat egg whites with salt until stiff and gradually add the sugar. Add cherry pulp to the egg mixture and mix thoroughly with rotary beater. Pile lightly into a serving dish or into individual dishes. Chill thoroughly and serve garnished with fresh cherries. Serves six.

## BEANS IN CUCUMBER RINGS

COOKED, green or wax beans, washed 12 cucumber rings, French dressing Lettuce Carrot curls or radish roses Arrange 12 to 16 beans per serving. Marinate in French dressing for 10 minutes. To make cucumber rings, cut cucumber into slices and remove pulpy interior. Fill rings with the whole beans, allowing two rings for each serving. Arrange on lettuce leaves and garnish with carrot curls or radish roses. Serve with additional salad dressing. Six servings.

## MOULDED EGG SALAD

1 tablespoon unflavored gelatine 1/4 cup cold water 1-2 cups boiling water 2 tablespoons vinegar 1 teaspoon salt 4 hard-cooked eggs, sliced 1 tablespoon chopped parsley 3 tablespoons chopped pickle 1 tablespoon grated onion 1/2 cup mayonnaise Soften the gelatine in the cold water. Add boiling water, vinegar and salt. When the gelatine mixture begins to stiffen, add the remaining ingredients. Pour into wet moulds and chill until firm. Serve on crisp lettuce or other salad greens and garnish with mayonnaise.
