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### Doctors Disagree With Lawmakers

#### So British Columbia Health Risk Bill Is shelved, Awaiting 'Break'

**VICTORIA, B. C.**—May 7—A health insurance program in which the doctors refuse to cooperate is like hash without any meat. It is not very successful.

British Columbia, Canada's progressive west coast province, is finding that out. For 20 years, social reformers, agitated for a health insurance law. A year ago it was enacted, March 1 of this year it was supposed to begin to operate.

But the doctors decided they would have none of it, and so informed the government. There was not enough money in it for them, they averred. So the government had no alternative but to suspend operation of the act.

The Liberal government of Premier T. D. Pattullo was elected in 1933 with the promise of health insurance as one of its main planks. So while it has suspended operation of the act, it dares not remove the law from the statute books. The government is awaiting events. Its only consolation being the knowledge that opposition parties can't make much political capital out of the situation.

**Provisions of Law**

No politician wants to play football when the ball is a packet of dynamite. And that is just what state health insurance means in a province that has led North America in social legislation of many kinds.

Included in such legislation were old age pensions (administered jointly by provincial and federal governments), mothers' pensions, workmen's compensation minimum wages and maximum working hour laws, to say nothing of education and health legislation.

As a beginning, health insurance was to cover approximately one-third of the province's 750,000 people, granting medical and hospital services to wage earners with incomes of \$1800 a year or less.

It was to cost them 2 per cent of their wages, with their employers paying another 1 per cent.

In return, the insured were guaranteed for themselves and dependents not only ordinary medical care and hospital treatment, but also the services, where necessary, of specialists and consultants. X-Rays and other diagnostic aids. Fifty per cent of the cost of medicines and medical care for wives before, during and after childbirth also was guaranteed.

**Plan Bogged Down**

For the doctors, the health insurance commission set up by the government proposed a flat yearly fee of \$5.50 for each person, employe or dependent, on their lists, whether that person required any medical care or not.

The doctors demanded \$7.50. They said any less would lower the standing of medical practice. Furthermore, they condemned the government plan as illusory, saying it made no provision for those who need health insurance most—the poor, and particularly those in relief.

The unexpectedness of the doctors' refusal to co-operate surprised the government when it

said, dropping 12 bombs, four of which took effect.

The statement said: "The ship belonged to those vessels designated the International Sea Patrol (to enforce the non-intervention agreement). Nevertheless, the armed cruiser suddenly was attacked with bombs, two airplanes of the Red Valencia Government swooping down upon it."

Word of the incident galvanized Germany. Hitler was in Munich. Foreign Minister Von Neurath and Admiral Erich Raeder, Chief of the Admiralty, met Hitler there and all three flew to Berlin where the cabinet was hastily summoned.

The Deutschland sped to Gibraltar under her own power to place her wounded in hospital.

The Valencia communique asserted the German craft had no definite business at Ibiza as the French Fleet was responsible for non-intervention control there.

London believed the bombings would confront the 27-nation Non-Intervention Committee with grave problems at today's sessions.

**COMFORT IN MODERN KITCHEN**

The pleasant, homey comfort of the old-fashioned kitchen need not be a thing of the past. Just because one wants the convenience and efficiency of the so-called "scientific" kitchen, is no excuse for having a cold, inhospitable, too business-like workshop product of the machine age. The modern kitchen doesn't have to look like a factory. Modern kitchens in many of the recently built houses prove it. One of these houses, a Cape Cod cottage type, was lately built for a woman who planned to do all her own housework herself. She designed her kitchen to be a friendly, pleasant room in which a good deal of the life of the family would centre. She had the walls papered with a gaily printed, scrubable wallpaper that gave warmth to the room.

She had modern equipment set on three sides of the room—a monel cabinet sink and closed metal wall and floor cabinets on one side, the range opposite and the refrigerator set into the third wall. She curtained the kitchen window in white ruffled scrim put beside it an old-fashioned rocking chair where she might sit when shelling peas, for instance, and watch her small child playing in the yard outside at the same time. A kitchen expert would have given this room a gold star for efficiency. A husband would give his approval by enjoying its welcome.

In just such kitchen, step-saving arrangement, standardized working heights, monel working tops and floor cabinets and ranges with indented toe space are only a few of the improvements which can and are replacing old equipment, making kitchens more livable rather than less so. And more spacious too. The new equipment is designed to be so compact that it leaves room in the kitchen for other things. Room for a desk at which there are a radio and a telephone connection, for instance. Or for enough room in which a baby's play space can be set up out of the way of kitchen traffic. For a separate laundry section or for a comfortable chair and a table where one can sit down and do odd jobs.

These new kitchens are more colorful, too. So wide a range of colors is now available in wall and floor coverings and in equipment, that the kitchen can be the gayest and most cheerful room in the whole house. Every wallpaper concern has its selection of bright scrutable papers. These can really be washed off with a damp cloth and are as practical for kitchen as other wall coverings. There are also many composition wall covering materials available in a variety of beautiful colors. Monel is especially harmonious in colorful kitchens since its silver color "goes" with any scheme. The use of this metal in combination with natural woods is also particularly effective. A nice idea also, is to use a washable enamel for painting the inside of the wall cabinets in one of the bright colors of the kitchen scheme. It is surprising how pretty even the kitchen dishes look against gay color.
