Parliamentary Cow-milking Contest Cancelled

OTTAWA, Feb. 13 — The great parliamentary cow-milking contest scheduled for tomorrow at the Central Experimental Farm has been called off. The Guardian was informed by prospective contenders this afternoon. Participants in the contest were to be Mrs. Gladys Strum, C.C.F. member for Qu'Appelle, Sask., and John Sinnott, Liberal member for Springfield, Man. The reason the matter came about was this: In the debate on establishment of the prices committee earlier this week, Mrs. Strum berated the Liberals and particularly the bachelor member Joseph Bradette of Cochrane for expressing his view on milk. It was the mothers of Canada who understood the milk question, not the bachelors, she said.

Interrupting, Mr. Sinnott shouted across the floor that he had milked more cows than Mrs. Strum had ever seen. The C.C.F. lady retorted that she would take the Springfield member on any time for a milking contest. "All right," she told this correspondent, "let's make it Sunday at the Experimental Farm."

Agriculture Minister Gardiner is said to have given the contest his official blessing, and Dr. E.S. Archibald, director, Dominion Experimental Farms, expressed willingness to co-operate. Animals to be milked were to be selected by the chief of the animal husbandry division. But today, Mrs. Strum said the contest, suddenly developed during the heat of debate would not go on. "It wouldn't be fair," she told this correspondent, "you see, I was talking with Mr. and Mrs. Sinnott some time ago, and got the very clear impression that it was she and not he who did most of the milking. Hence it would be taking an unfair advantage to use that previous knowledge. Besides, I must confess I haven't milked a cow for a long time. I mightn't do too well at it myself." It seems too bad in a way," she mused. "If we had a formal contest and charged admission we could make a lot of money for the party."

Mr. Sinnott stands pat and says he is ready and willing to go ahead with the contest any time.

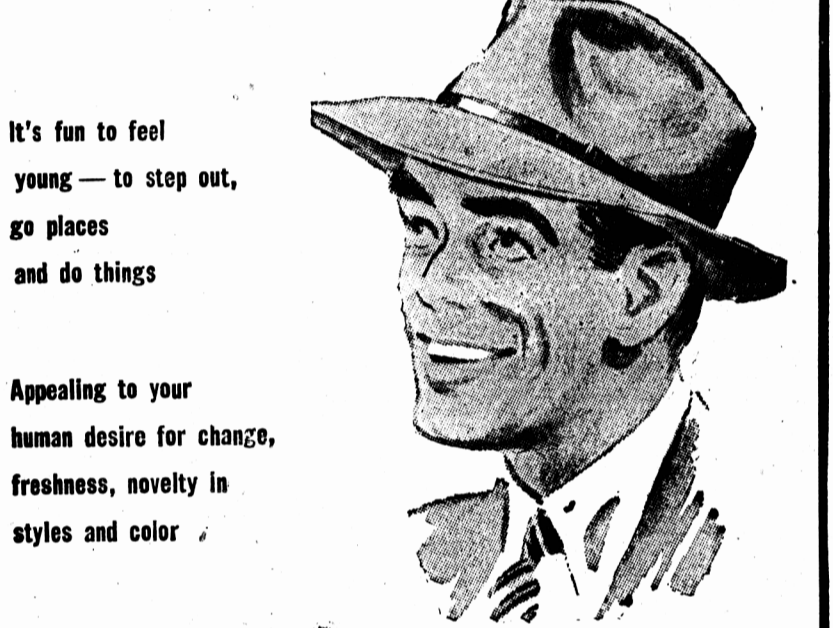
