The wedding was a quiet one, only the immediate relatives and friends of the family being present. Prince Edward Islanders who served in the South African war will no doubt be interested to know that at a meeting of the British Veterans Society held in Halifax a few days ago, the following resolutions were unanimously passed by a standing vote:—Whereas a Bill has been introduced into the House of Commons, authorizing the Government of Canada to grant lands in the Province of Alberta and Saskatchewan, to men who enlisted from the territory now covered by these Provinces for service in South Africa during the late Boer war; And whereas, the forces sent to South Africa from Canada were Canadian forces, and not Provincial or Territorial forces; And whereas, the lands which it is proposed to grant under the provisions of said Bill are the property of Canada as a whole, and not of the Province in question. And whereas, the interests of the Provinces named will be equally well served by the granting of such lands to all Canadians who enlisted from any part of Canada. Therefore Resolved, that it is the opinion of this meeting that the matter of the granting of such lands should be treated from a Canadian rather than from a sectional standpoint, and that all Canadians who enlisted from Canada should receive equal consideration. Further Resolved, that copies of this resolution be forwarded to all the local papers and the M. P's. for Nova Scotia.
